NEW YORK, May 1.-Henry Clews, head the banking house of Henry Clews & writes of the situation in Wall street

Although there is no probability of any large amount of money being immediately by the government, yet the secretary is evidently impressed with the desirableness of ampie appropriations being made as early as pensible. Between n.w and August is usually a period of ease in the loan market. Three to four months hence, however, money will be wanted for the interior in large amounts and important treasury negotiations coming concurrently with that movement might cause a conflict between the two currents of demand detrimental to each. This is among the factors of the future already discounted. The banks are putting themselves in a position for contracting for large amounts of the new bonds. This is having some influence upon the discount market and on time loans; but I see no reason to apprehend that such effects will be at all serious in their bearing on the general business of the country. Within the last ten weeks the loans and discounts of the local banks have been reduced \$51.000,000; which shows how much the banks have already done in anticipation of the special financial demands that have now strien. It is not to be concluded, however, that this contraction of credit has fallen principally upon commercial borrowers, for as a matter of fact a large portion of the liquidation has arisen from the settlement of various syndicate operations to which the banks had made very large advances.
