SAMPSON WILL GO AFTER THE FLOTILLA

Knows of Its Presence at Martinique -Pellef that French Have De-Inyed Cable Messages from There.

partment was all excitement this morning pon the receipt of the news that Admiral Sampson's squadron had begun the bombardment of San Juan de Porto Rico, and fuel was added to the flames when the news came later that the Spanish flying squadron had been sighted off Martinique, giving promise of heavy fighting to come. The fact that the admiral gave notice of his intention came later that the Spanish flying squadron to bombard San Juan, as is reported from St. Thomas, is an indication that the movement upon San Juan was not a suddenly conceived project, but a well matured plan. Whether or not the orders to the admiral included a bombardment is not disclosed at the Navy department. Indeed there is nothing in Sampson's report to indicate that he really did bombard the place. Black and white costumes in organdic, batiste, India muslin and other sheer fabrics, trimmed with frills and insertions of lace, promise to be very popular during the summer season.

A simple example of black and white combination is an organdic gown with a charming little corsage made with a deep-pointed ruffle, back and front allike, which falls very full from a double row of shirring, and finishes in jabot effect at the point. This frill continues over the sleeves, producing a graceful breadth across the shoulder. The front and back of the corsage are slightly full at the waist line. The high collar is draped, and the square yoke of fulled muslin is framed at the shoulders by bands of black velvet ribbon, with butterfly bows at the ends. An additional touch of black is given by the girdle and velvet baby ribbons that border the entire ruffle in several rows and edge the frills of the sleeves, which are shirred from shoulder to wrist, with a tiny ruffle in each seam. The skirt, a six-gored model, is trimmed wrist, with a tiny ruffle in each seam.
