Warm Weather in the West Weaken Corn and Onts and Those Markets Are Lower, Provisions

Alone Being Higher.

CHICAGO, May 18.-The sentiment of speculators in the wheat market today was bearish. Cables showed declines and prices tended steadily downward, July declining 2%c and September closing 15-Sc lower. Corn and oats were weakened by the higher temperature throughout the west. July corn at the close showing a loss of 7-5c and oats 14:714c. Provision held up, despite the big influx of hogs, pork closing 714c, lard 214c

and July ribs 5c higher.

It was a weak day in wheat, with the cables for the first time in a long while prov-ing a bear motive. Liverpool was 25:3d lower, Paris 15@55 lower, Antwerp off 25950 centimes. Western receipts were not so large as they have been, but there was perfect weather and good crop reports from every direction, even from abroad. The market was much affected by a report that every direction, even from abroad. The market was much affected by a report that Expert Inglis estimated the wheat possibilities as high as \$90,000,000 bushels. The figures were considered preposterous, but it drew attention to the fact that everyone was apparently willing to concede that there was the prospect of the largest crop ever harvested. Clearings amounted to \$20,000 bu. Primary receipts were \$95,000 bu. compared with 511,000 bu. last year. The speculative trade was light and pit temper excitable, although decidedly bearish. Decilines were sufficient all around in every market in the world. July opened ic lower at \$1.07, rose to \$1.0745, declined to \$105 and recovered to \$1.0046, the closing figure. September began ½c under yesterday's close at \$945, rallied to \$945c, fell back to \$85c and closed at 88 1-8c. May ranged from \$1.40 to \$1.50 and closed at the lowest.

Corn for awhile today showed steadiness. There was a good deal of rain and more was predicted. Temperatures, however, were good, and the weekly crop bulletins were favorable. Lohrke, the New York expert authority, said the other side was full of corn and that it needed to be digested before there was further buying. Corn finally broke with wheat. Receipts were 201 cars; July opened ¼c lower at 351-8c, firmed up to \$54c and then went down gradually to \$51-8c, which was the closing price.

steady. There was some inquiry from ship-pers, but bids were too low. Receipts were 264 cars; July opened 1-86f4c lower at 28 1-8c, advanced to 284c and declined to 294 cars; July opened 1-884c lower at 251-5c, advanced to 25%c and declined to 256725 1-8c at the close.

The provision market today proved a puzzle. Large hog receipts-59,690, with 44,690 estimated for Thursday-led to the expectation of a weak day. The market early made a dip, but as the session advanced the trade showed surprising steadiness. Seemingly outsiders either were not loaded, or else so well loaded that no stop loss order selling was necessary. Packers generally have been buyers. Hegs declined 15026c; July pork opened 17½c lower at \$12.96, sold up to \$12.32½ and reacted to \$12.27½ at the close. Lard for July started unchanged at \$5.625, declined to \$5.60 and closed at \$5.6566 ff½c; July ribs began 5c lower at \$5.30, rose to \$6.42½ and closed at \$6.619.
