

NEBRASKA BOYS ON THE COAST

First Regiment of Volunteers is Enjoying Life on the Pacific.

GET A WARM WELCOME AT SAN FRANCISCO

People of the Golden Gate Make the Arrival of the Eastern Troops an Occasion for a Fine Display of Hospitality.

All reports from the First regiment of Nebraska volunteers now encamped at San Francisco, preparatory to embarking for the Philippine islands, are to the effect that the boys are well and happy. They are well-browned from their camp life of three weeks at Lincoln and on week on the Pacific coast.

With them as a treasured regimental mascot the Nebraska boys took to the coast a beautiful golden eagle, presented in Lincoln, their starting point, by William Jennings Bryan. "America" came in a cage, but henceforth it will perch proudly in front of their colonel's tent restrained only by a small chain.

The first section passed through Sacramento unobserved and unnoticed; the second attracted 500 good natured citizens in the California capital, but by the time the third section had arrived 5,000 people, nearly half of them school children, hurriedly assembled for the purpose, were at the station with great quantities of flowers, that were showered into the cars.

During the long wait at San Francisco before any troops came and during the interval between the marching away of the Second battalion and the appearance of the First, the women of the Red Cross society had not been idle.

Tables within the great reception room just opposite the ferry slip were covered with these hundreds of happy contributions. Later decorative flags were borrowed from the neighboring signal office and from the chief wharfinger, and yards upon yards of bunting in the national colors were gathered from somewhere else until the high walls and the sides of the refreshment tables became bright with effective and appropriate drapery.

The others under the weather were John Queen, suffering from fever, and C. C. Jones, tonsillitis.

No time was lost by the Nebraska boys in going into camp on the site provided for them at the old Bay District race track. Lieutenant Neill, U. S. A., was on the grounds awaiting the arrival of the troops, and he guided Major Stotsenburg, who was in command, over the several fields. Both officers greeted each other with unusual cordiality, owing to the fact that they were at West Point together. Major Stotsenburg was, until recently, first lieutenant in the Sixth United States cavalry.

Their Village of Tents. Within a few minutes after the men were on the grounds the picket line was thrown out and all interlopers were ordered out. The lines, Squads were detailed to unload the commissary wagons and for half an hour some of the most stalwart of Nebraska's sons were unpacking tents and tent poles, flour, potatoes and a variety of vegetables and other provisions.

command is in need of nothing except uniforms for a few recruits who were mustered in just before they left Nebraska. Tents were up in a jiffy, and what had been a short time before a series of broad fields with waving grass was transformed into a white tented village of active soldiers.

The officers and men expressed themselves as highly pleased with their camping ground. What was thought to be the only possible objectionable feature was the strong wind that blows in from the ocean, but these sturdy men regarded the wind as "just the thing to keep a fellow warm," as one of them put it. The Spring Valley Water company had pipes laid and everything in readiness for supplying water before the troops arrived.
