Ans at last had the effect of cutting off receipts, and today only thirty-two loads were counted in the yards. It was the smallest run of the month and the lightest of any day since the middle of April. Shippers, however, must bear in mind that the decline is general at all points and not peculiar to this market lalone, so that there is no more reason for holding back hogs from this market than from any other.

holding back hogs from this market than from any other. This morning the market opened strong to 5c higher on the light mixed and com-monish loads. The good heavy hogs sold steady. In other words, the hogs that hrought \$4.05 on Saturday sold largely at \$4.074.074.10 today, but the best hogs sold at \$4.124.074.15, the same as on Saturday. The very fact that there were so few hogs here seemed to act against the mar-ket, as there was too many for one buyer and not enough to go around among them all. The result was that after one or two buyers got the few that they had to have no one seemed to care about the balance and the market lost its early strength and became weak and very dull.
