#### Han d'Or Does it in the Latonia Derby for Mile and a Half.

LOWERS COLORS OF THE GREAT PLAUDIT

1

Ten Thousand People Witness One of the Grandest Races Ever Pulled Off on an Ameriean Track.

CINCINNATL O., June 9.-The mighty has fallen. Plaudit, the greatest 3-year-old of the year, met his first defeat of the season today at the Latonia derby after one of the grandest contests ever witnessed on the western turf. Han d'Or is the colt that lowered the colors of the Madden pride and in doing it he also lowered the world's rec-

wire Plaudit made a gallant effort to come up, but it was of no use. His speed and endurance were gone and Han d'Or crossed the wire a winner by three lengths amid great excitement in the grandstand and loud cheers from the hundreds of stable hands in the field.

No race run at Latonia ever created more enthusiasm and every horseman on the track pronounced it the grandest race since the days of Tenbroeck.

The track, contrary to expectations, was lightning fast and all conditions favored good time being made. However, few people thought the world's record would be The race from a time standpoint beaten. was a most remarkable one.

There were but two starters and little time was lost in getting them away from the The pair went away heads together and Han d'Or at once set out to make his own pace. The first half mile was covered In fifty seconds, the six furlongs in 1:14 1-4, seven furlongs in 1:27 1-2; mile in 1:40 1-4, mile and an eighth in 1:54, the mile and a quarter in 2:07 1-4: the final time being 2:32 1-2, which was a guarter second better than any previous record.

Plaudit could not overtake Han d'Or from the start. The latter led by three lengths until the stretch was reached when Plaudit tried to make his run, but the killing pace had told on him and Han d'Or won in handy fashion

Enthusiasm Over the Jockey. Jockey Conley, who rode the winner, was surrounded by a large crowd after he had dismounted and carried to the scales room on the shoulders of several enthusiastic friends.

Plaudit was always 1 to 7 in the betting while as good as 5 to 1 could be had on Han d'Or.

The derby is worth \$7,000 to the winner, which is the property of George A. Singerly. The mile and a half record is held by Buckwa, who ran the distance at Oakland, December 24 last year, in 2:32¼, but as a 6-year-old, he carried only 103 pounds, so that Han d'Or's record is the better. The best previous performance by a 3-year-old was Lamplighter's mile and a half August 9, 1892, at Mohmouth park, in 2:32%, with

be as advantageous as a mint in every way with the exception that not as many men will be employed. Another difference beween the two institutions is that all bul ion is shipped to a mint at the expense of the government, while the government does not share any of the expenses incurred in the transportation of gold to an assay office. The theory of the government in re-

gard to the establishment and operation of assay offices is to place them at a point in the country that is convenient to miners, so as to encourage the mining industry and the development of gold. In the establishment of these assay offices it is the desire and intention of the government to put all of the mining districts practically on he same basis, so that each territory will be

#### Kansas Wheat Estimate.

TOPEKA, Kan., June 9.-(Special.)-The nonthly bulletin of the Kansas Board of other men against whom there had been no Agriculture, issued today, estimates that the wheat prospects are the most promising of any June in the history of the state, the general average condition being given at 103. The stand and growth of the plants are not only very excellent, but the absence of injury by insects is equally noticeable

The report issued on June 4 last year showed the average condition in the state to be \$3, and still the wheat crop was the largest in the history of the state. This year, with the average condition at 103, it is expected the wheat crop of last year will be surpassed by several millions of bushels.

The conditions which have been so favorble to wheat have been adverse to corn etarding planting, germinating and culti-

vating. Huch of the seed planted rotted in the ground, hence much replanting is yet being done. Corn which has come up has made but limited growth. However, in the last few days the situation has considerably improved, the condition for the entire state being 79.



If the miners bring out the gold themselves it is quite natural that they will go ashore at the first stopping place where is located a United States assay office and where they could at once get paid for the gold brought back. It is a fact that Seattle will be the first stopping place where the miners can receive pay for their gold, and we expect

that they will come here. Seattle will be benefited a hundred fold, as it is a fact that at every place in the United States where is located an assay office the miners spend much of the money they receive, many of them locate there permanently, while others invest their wealth in business

enterprises. "I have already placed orders for the entire equipment of the assay office and it John F. Reynolds Landis, First cavalry, to is expected to arrive here by July 1. expect that the chief assayer in charge of the office will be appointed shortly by President McKinley. The chief assayer has power to appoint his assistants, but all of his appointees are subject to the approval of the directors of the mint, and to the provisions of the civil service act. Several mportant places in the office will probably be filled by promotion from other assay offices in the country. The other assay offices and their annual receipts are: Denver, cock, to be transferred from infantry arm the most important in the country, \$12,000,-000 in gold; Charleston, N. It will be readily seen that the entire force in the office will not be new to the business. A Mint Not Likely.

"No, I don't believe that a mint will be stablished at Seattle, although it is a hard hing to predict what congress will do. For my part I believe that three mints, one at Denver, Philadelphia and San Francisco, are adequate to the denands of the country.



"From late advices just received by me the output of gold this year promises to go beyond the wildest expectations of every body. Colorado is making an extraordinary record and within another two years I be lieve that the gold product of that state alone will equal the present output of the entire United States. South Dakota is also increasing her production rapidly, and predict that the entire output of the country during the present year, inclusive of Alaska, will reach \$100,000,000. South Africa is running us a very close race. In 1897 the output of that country was only \$2,000,000 be-hind the United States, and I have been ad-vised that during the first part of 1898 the Rand district was running 50 per cent ahead of last year. The present gold production of the world is far ahead of both the gold

and silver production a few years ago. In
