The finances of the grand lodge were shown by Grand Treasurer Hartman's report to be in good shape. A balance of \$3,000 was reported in the Masonic Home fund.

Grand Secretary Bowen's report was submitted and among other things it shows is that there are seventy Free Masons over 65 years of age who have been placed on the retired list and are, therefore, exempted from the payment of dues under the grand lodge enactment of June 11, 1896.




