END OF A LONG AND EXCITING CONTEST

Storm Lake Judge Defeats Congressman Perkins and Gets the Nomination on the 217th Ballot.

LEMARS, Ia., June 23.—(Special Telegram.)—Congressman George D. Perkins was defeated for re-nomination this afternoon in the Eleventh Iowa republican convention, Judge Tom Thomas of Storm Lake being the successful candidate. The nomination of Judge Thomas was effected, and the long deadlock broken on the 217th ballot, after one of the most stubborn and hard fought contests in the history of Iowa politics.
