Figures on the Value of the Lines that Cross Nebraska.

ESTIMATES FURNISHED BY THE COMPANIES

Attorneys Hand in Some Figures for the Edition of the State Board of Transportation in Connection with Tibbles' Case.

LINCOLN, June 27.—(Special.)—

The report handed in by the Fremont, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley system is on the 1,091 miles within the state and is summarized as follows: Estimated cost of construction is as follows: Right of way, 1,091 miles, \$3,616,000; Bridges, 1,091 miles, \$1,091,000; etc.
