The activity of Major General Shafter's army at Santiago rudely shakes the old saw, "great bodies move slowly." General Shafter weighs 114 pounds.

John W. Marshall of Illinois, who will enjoy the distinction of being the first negro to wear a colonel's uniform in the United States army as commander of the Eighth Illinois volunteers, now mustering in, has been employed for five years as clerk in the clerk's office of Cook county.

The honor fell to Admiral Sampson to command the largest armada ever assembled on the coast of the New York York at the breaking of the first gun on the torpederos on the Merrimac, to be exploded when Lieutenant Hobson and his men sank her.

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WHERE THE BATTLE RAGES.

A civil engineer of Chicago, who has spent many years in the vicinity of Santiago, gives the following description of the battleground of General Shafter's troops:

The bottom is of alluvial soil and in time of rain is boggy and the road bad. There are a few farms scattered through it, but in the main it is densely covered with Spanish and American soldiers.

Should the American army pass down the river on the ford, and then move in the direction of Morro Castle, it would have to pass through a narrow gap in the mountains, and the command of the road would make possible the easy transportation of artillery.

The Spanish army, as it now exists in Santiago, will probably have to depend on itself. There is talk of its being reinforced by a large body of troops from the interior under General Pando.
