Form in a Semi-Circle.

The advance forces are in a semi-circle, the left flank resting about two miles from those under command of General Chaffee, with the extreme right under command of Colonel Miles, about a mile to the northwest. Beginning with the Twelfth Infantry at the extreme left, the Seventh, Seventeenth, Fourth, Twenty-fifth and Tenth infantry extend to the right in the order named. Beyond them picket lines are established three-quarters of a mile nearer, Santiago city being in sight of General Chaffee and Colonel Miles troops.

A large number of Red Cross flags are flying from the buildings in Santiago, Seven such flags could be counted today, and it is reported two more were hoisted tonight. They are all flying from the largest and most prominent buildings, and our officers say the Spanish soldiers evidently intend to thus try to protect every place in the city offering a good mark for the artillery.
