There is confirmation of the sinking of the Spanish schooner Trafalgar the day after the last Santiago bombardment.

MOVING SLOWLY FORWARD

American Troops Are Being Mobilized Near Santiago de Cuba.

MOMENT OF ATTACK IS YET UNKNOWN

Enemy Within Santiago Holds Red Cross Flags Over Nine of the Principal Buildings to Stay Artillery Fire.

(Copyright, 1918, by Associated Press.) OFF JURUGUA, Province of Santiago de Cuba, June 29.—(On Board Associated Press Dispatch Boat Dandy.)—The force of the American army is being mobilized as rapidly as possible in the vicinity of Aguadores, four miles from Santiago de Cuba.

From Biquiri, where the artillery was landed, to the present point of concentration, the road runs through a tangle of tropical undergrowth, up and down steep hillsides, and over a succession of swamp-bordered streams for a distance of over twelve miles.

General Shafter left his ship today and took up his quarters at Wheeler at the front. His appearance there gave rumor that an attack would be made tomorrow, but the staff officers say tonight it is impossible to get the army in shape to strike a blow for several days.

The advance forces are in a semi-circle, the left flank resting about two miles from the main command of General Chaffee, with the extreme right under command of Colonel Miles, about a mile to the northwest.

A large number of Red Cross flags are flying from the buildings. Seven such flags could be counted today, and it is reported two more were hoisted tonight.

For the last day or two the landings have been without incident. The hospital corps has finished its camp and several patients are already undergoing treatment.

Word was received by Rear Admiral Sampson today that the Spanish supply boat Purissima Concepcion, which escaped from Jamaica recently, has arrived safely at Tampa, the port of Santa Spiritus, on the southern coast of Santa Clara.

Reinforcements for Shafter Have Not Yet Left Tampa. WASHINGTON, June 29.—Contrary to the expectation of the War department, officials there seem to have been some delay at Tampa in dispatching the transports from there with reinforcements for General Shafter.

Newport Takes Money for Troops. SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—The Call says the steamer Newport, which is sailing for Key West tomorrow, will carry \$100,000 in gold for the troops.

Not Bought by the Government. WASHINGTON, June 29.—It is stated at the War department that the government has not purchased the cargo of the steamer Tepeka, in command of Captain Cowles, to proceed on to Key West.

Repair the French Cable. PLAYSA DEL ESTE, French cable, cut some time ago near Guantanamo by the auxiliary cruiser St. Louis, has been repaired by the cable boat Adria.

LOOKING FOR A CONFLICT

Conditions Are Such that a Battle May Be Expected at Any Moment.

DIRECT COMMUNICATION WITH SHAFER

Telegraph Connects His Camp with Washington and News of Importance Can Be Received Without Delay.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—The situation at the close of the day was described by Secretary Alger as being such as to warrant him in the expectation of news at any moment. There were two parties to a battle, and it might be precipitated by either side, and no one here knew what the Spanish disposition was, and no one knew General Shafter's plan of attack.

The opinion is held that the navy will cooperate in the attack on Santiago, and to that part of Shafter's force is to move on Morro and capture the place and open the gateway to the harbor by removing the mines.

It is calculated that the second installment of the reinforcements dispatched to General Shafter from Camp Alger reached him today on the Harvard, and the steamer Yale is expected at Newport News day after tomorrow.

The department is thoroughly satisfied with the success attending this method of transporting troops, having found it not only more economical than the combined rail and water route via Tampa, but more expeditious.

Major General Coppinger is not to go to Santiago with any of these additional forces. He is senior to General Shafter, and if sent to Santiago, by virtue of the army regulations, would assume command of the army in front of that place.

It was announced at the Navy department that the Cadiz squadron had paid the heavy Suez canal tolls, and was about to proceed eastward through the canal, though this statement was probably erroneous, owing to the later reports indicating that the Spanish vessels were stopping for repairs.

The delays to which the Spaniards are subjected in Manila will retard greatly to the advantage of Admiral Dewey, if Camara is still in reality bound for the Philippines, for they insure the arrival of all the whole of General Merritt's military force, and almost certainly of the cruiser Chicago and the monitors Monterey and Monadnock, before the Spanish squadron could reach Manila.

The reports from Santiago as to reconnoitering parties and efforts of our officers to take observations leads to the belief that the United States fleet will be utilized by General Shafter as a means of surveying Santiago and all the surrounding country.

No Probability of Reported Sinking of Brooklyn Is True. WASHINGTON, June 29.—No word has come to the Navy department from Admiral Sampson making the slightest reference to the Spanish story of the sinking of the Brooklyn by a shell from the Santiago harbor defenses.

GIVES NO COAL TO THE SPANISH. American Ship Captain Takes a Firm Stand. WASHINGTON, June 29.—A second case of an attempt to transfer coal from an American to a Spanish merchantman in Mexico has brought out the old time pluck of an American seaman.
