

RESULTS AT THE RACE MEET

Fair Sized Crowd Sees a Very Good Card Pulled Off.

YOUNGSTERS SHOW UP IN BEST FORM

Three-Year-Olds Trot Like Veterans and the Others Put Up an Excellent Exhibition of Speed on the Track.

There was a nice crowd at the races yesterday afternoon, but it was not by any means of the size it should have been. Still it was something of an improvement upon the preceding days and the management looks for bigger attendance today and tomorrow. This afternoon has been set aside for the women again, and a good contingent of the gentler sex will probably be out. The card was a crackerjack. The 3-year-olds trotted like veterans, racing below the 29 mark, and once running dead heat. In the 2:24 class a half mile in one of the heats was covered in 1:04 and the mile in little over 2:10. That's pretty nearly flying for this class. And in the 2:17 trot there was a field of horses fit to go upon the grand circuit at any time.

There were four starters in the first race—the trot for 3-year-olds for a purse of \$400. They were: Dr. Spelman, b. & Prodigal (McAvoy), Smith & Reynolds, Anaconda, Mont.; Iatan, ch. g., Norstar (Brock), Palmer L. Clark, St. Joseph, Mo.; Black Robert, blk. h., H. McRoberts (Chandler), Riverside Farm, Berlin, Wis.; Ellen Madison, b. t., James Madison (Ward), F. E. Ward, San Bernardino, Cal.

There was a hot finish to the first heat. Boeck had Iatan at the head all the while, but of length to the wire, he was beaten by Dr. Spelman. At the turn into the stretch, however, the Montana horse made a great spurt and drew up to Iatan. Some fifty feet from the wire both horses broke and they both finished the mile up in the air with not an inch difference between them—a clear dead heat. Ellen Madison was third and Black Robert was distanced, but by declaring it a dead heat the judges allowed the latter to start again. Time: 2:20s.

Pretty Race from This Out.
