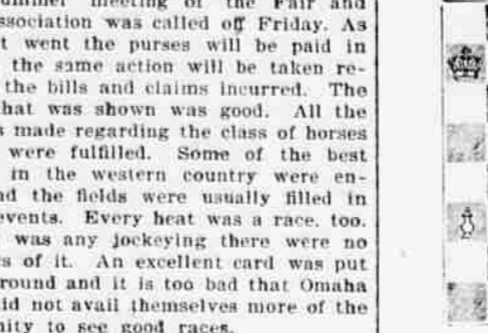
AS VIEWED BY FOREIGNER

Intelligence is the thing. "Why, my boy," said he, "that's just it—intelligence. The American soldier has more intelligence than any soldier in the world."

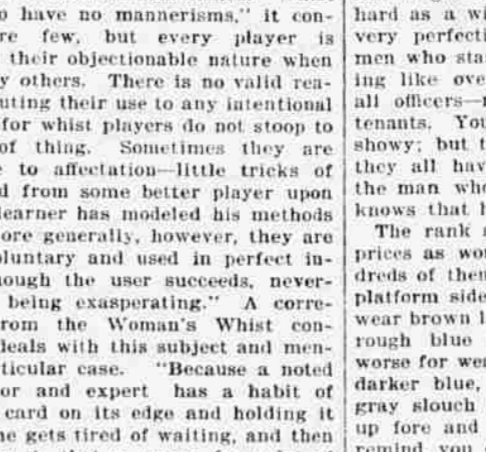
He is not decorative by any means, but he is six feet tall. His coat, built by some prairie post tailor, wrinkles over his back and chest.
