PUTS UP THE PRICE OF TWINE Blockade of Manila Expensive for Farmers Who Have Grain to Pind.

NEW YORK, July 5.-The World says: Admiral Dewey's blockade of the Philippines threatens to create a cordage dearth throughout the civilized world. It has doubled the price of Manila rope and twine in this country, and, by doubling the value of Manila hemp, has made fortunes for manufacturers who had large stocks in reserve. The John Good Cordage and Machine company, which was forced into the hands of a receiver several months ago, was among th concerns which held a reserve stock of the hemp, and steps are being taken to reorganize the company on a solid financial basis John Good, of Cordage fame, discussed the situation at the machine works, Park and Washington avenues, Brooklyn,

"It will require," he said, "about 150,000,000 pounds of Manila twinthis year's wheat cros bind in the United States. From the closes estimates we can make we find the present supply of Manila hemp, outside the Philip pine islands, will be exhausted in three months. As considerable time is required to transport the hemp from Manila to this ountry, we will have to arrange matters oon, or the cordage manufacturers will find themselves without any raw material. In that event the great western wheat farms would soon have no binding material to use on their reapers and might be forced back to the old-fashioned method of binding their sheaves with straw. This would be a tremendous task in the fields, which cover miles upon miles of territory, and may re sult in the loss of much of the grain through the exposure to the weather. Sisal twine, the material for which comes from Mexico might be substituted in the reapers for the Manila, but the supply of that is limited and would certainly not be sufficient to mee the demand.

"You may gain some idea of the immensity of the demand when I tell you that the 150,000,000 pounds of twine required this year by the farmers would contain 99,000, 000,000 lineal feet and would cost them about \$18,000,000. Since the war began the price of Manila hemp has run up from 4 to 842 cents a pound. I think it is selling at 8 cents today. English merchants, through their local agents, are offering it for sale here at the market price, but will not guar antee its delivery at any specified time.

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
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
