

MACHINE APPEARS TO CLOG

Nebraska Populists Give Evidence of Doing Their Own Thinking.

READY MADE TICKETS NOT IN FAVOR

Expressions of Opinion from Western Populists Not Encouraging to the Manipulators of the State House Nominating Apparatus.

LINCOLN, July 17.—(Special).—The populists who drift into the state house from around about the state are exhibiting considerable anxiety as to the procedure of the coming state convention, and the state house machine is exerting itself to prevent the way for another three-tinged performance similar to that of last year. Ear marks of its work are seen in the batch of letters printed in the last issue of its recognized official organ, the Independent, purporting to represent the sentiment of the party in respect to the platform and the attitude toward the democratic and the silver republican conventions, called to meet at the same time and in the same place.

As might be expected, while some difference of opinion is expressed, the echoes of the machine are all for fusion at any price, even at the risk of abdicating the powers of the convention to another combination conference committee.

The dissenting opinions are not notable, being that of certain populists, the most of which represented the Fifty-fourth district in the legislature. He says, first as to the leading articles in the platform: "Platform immaterial as long as democratic lawyers run party," second, as to attitude toward the platform, "The party who started the war work it while, populists will do well to take care of their own business," third, as to form of action to void democratic and silver republican conventions: "These matters are already fixed from the private side of the door in a static confusion, no matter whether straight populists, fusion or straight democratic, it is all the same outfit nominated by the democratic club in Omaha. They will no more shandon it than will rats abandon fresh cheese."

Another significant answer is that of Representative Snyder of the Fifty-seventh district, who is said to be a preacher, but who ends his communication as follows: "No more such damn fooling as we had a year ago."

West Wants Recognition.

Another significant movement comes in from the western part of the state, where delegates to the populist convention will doubtless demand recognition on the ticket. For example, Lester O. Clough, chairman of the Cheyenne county committee, announces through the same source that the western part of the state will certainly combine to divide the rights in the state of the state government. He continues: "We get practically no share in the patronage at the hands of the legislature each session and we work here up for the state officers in each campaign, and after they are elected they select all their appointees from their own county, or nearly so. Most of them are in office now, have no greater right to be in office now than we have, and they do not take kindly to efforts out of the usual line by officers to hold them selves in."

We are going to ask at the next state convention a proper distribution demanded by fairness, and we believe a much greater and more complete one than we have now. The same sentiment is expressed in the resolutions recently adopted by the Lincoln county populist convention, which formally requests the nomination for governor to be given to the western end of the state, and denounces as impolitic and unjust the practice of the government of the western counties of the state to give the west end its constitutional rights by just representation of the state into senatorial and representative districts.

Another evidence of the form of a protest against the exclusive nomination of lawyers for the highest places of honor and trust by a party which has its strength with the farmers and pretends to represent the producing classes.

Objects to Lawyers.

An interesting example of the outcropping of this sentiment is found in the following letter, endorsing the candidacy of D. Clem Deaver, which seems to have escaped, by accident, the censorship of the machine paper that is supposed to control the populist organ.

GILELY, Neb., July 6.—To the Editor of the Independent: As the time for holding the state convention and the people will soon be called upon to select their standard bearer, I wish, through the columns of your excellent paper, to express my preference as to whom he shall be, as a good many others have done. For governor of a young and growing state, with her varied resources like Nebraska, we need a man of experience that knows something about how people earn their living and how they make their money; a man that is aware of the times and is keeping there. I believe, Mr. Editor, we have such a man in the person of the Hon. D. Clem Deaver of Omaha. He has been one of the early pioneers of Jefferson and Thayer counties and was among the most successful of our early farmers. I know him well; I knew him when he was chairman of the people's party state central committee and also in his present situation, and he has always been

Ask for Restraining Order.

COLUMBUS, Neb., July 17.—(Special).—Late last night a petition was filed in the district court here by County Attorney O'Brien asking for a restraining order enjoining the Great Eastern Cable company from running the Columbus lateral along and parallel with the meridian line (so called) between this city and the lateral portion of the United States. This action was taken as the result of two unsuccessful attempts since in trying to adjust matters in an amicable manner. The necessary bond filed with the petition was signed by the Great Eastern Cable company. The lateral strikes the line about two miles north of the city and runs parallel with it for a distance of about two miles. This is perhaps one of the worst pieces of contention that the irrigation company has struck, although their path has been a bed of roses in Platte county. The members of the board are all advocates of irrigation and do not wish to be understood as trying to throw water upon the enterprise. A large number of farmers who live along the line of the lateral are present at the meeting of the board and the irrigation officers. Many of them are complaining of the proposed route. It is thought Judge Albert will give the case his immediate attention.

UNIVERSITY SUMMER SCHOOL

Most Prosperous Session Ever Held Comes to a Close.

ATTENDANCE OVER TWO HUNDRED FIFTY

Famine Follows Honors of War in the Belaguered City.

NAKED AND STARVING REFUGEES

Food Cannot Be Had in the City for Love Nor Money—Frightful Condition of the Spanish Garrison Troops.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, July 17.—Since 4 o'clock this morning a stream of refugees has been pouring into the city, some naked, all hungry, skeletons and footsore.

The town of Santiago presents a dismal sight. Most of the houses have been sacked and the stores have all been looted and nothing to eat can be had for love or money. In the streets of the city this morning at the entrenched, at the breastworks and at every hundred feet or so of the barbed wire fence were the living skeletons of Spanish soldiers.

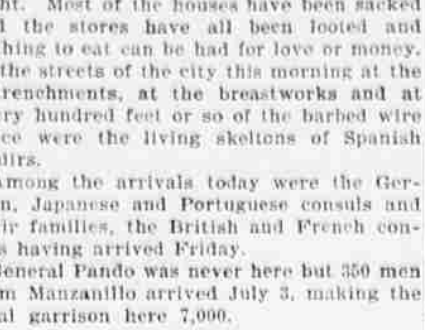
