Without exception they are enthusiastic boomers of the states they represent and they are never tired of entertaining visitors with practical object lessons on the mineral wealth that lies under the mountains of the west. One of these is Commissioner J. J. Leeson, who is in charge of the New Meyleo exhibit and who is a firm believer in the future of his state. He

BAY8:

'New Mexico is very likely to witness, in the next year, a remarkable advancement in gold mining, and even now the tide has set in, bringing with it not only men of wide experience in mining, but those who have the means to bring the mineral to the surface. New Mexico has an area of 122,500 square miles, with a population of some 270,000. It was settled in 1553 by the Spaniards; belonged to the Spanish crown until 1821, and from that time on it formed a part of the Republic of Mexico until the treaty of Guadalupe de Hidalgo in 1846, when it became a part of the United States. Prior to 1821, or during the time that this territory belonged to the crown of Spain. numerous grants of land, more or less extensive, sometimes including hundreds of thousands of acres, were made by the Spanish crown to individual settlers of Spanish origin, and the confusion as to titles resulting from these ancient grants, the vagueness of the description of their boundnries in what was then an almost valueless country, has led to serious complications, but by an act of congress a court of private land claims has been created, and through the energetic work of this court most all of the titles have or are

being satisfactorily adjusted. 'This territory has some eighty-five mining districts, which are scattered widely and cover a large section of country, thus showing that the mineral wealth is by no means confined in any one special place but largely developed over a great extent of not only holding their record as steady wealth of the territory and nation, and \$50, running \$18 to the ounce. bringing into prominent notice the different sections of the territory more particularly adapted to mining. By examining any ordinary map of the western states it will be seen that all the most valuable recent developments of mineral in southern Colorado are on a well defined line following the Rocky Mountain system into and across New Mexico, and that the line extends through central west and soouthwest porlions of the territory without a break of any onsiderable length. That conditions along this extent of country, almost 400 miles in length, in many respects resemble the gold and allver bearing formation of Crede, Cripple Creek, Rosita, Silver Cliff, Leadville and the great San Juan country of Colorado, cannot be doubted, and in the coming years t is not unlikely this section of New Mexico may develop many places as productive of wealth as the Colorado districts named at

WASHINGTON, July 22 .- The following cablegram has just been received at the War department:

HONG KONG, July 22 .- Secretary of the Navy: Following is for the secretary of war to the adjutant general: Aguinaldo leclares dictatorship and martial law over all the islands. The people expect inde-pendence. Recommend China ponies. ANDERSON.

Colonel Anderson was the senior army OLD GLORY FLOATS ON MORRO officer at the Philippines when the dispatch was sent, probably several days before its Hong Kong date. The reference to China ponies means that Colonel Anderson desires that kind of cavalry animals.

MANILA, July 19 .- (Via Hong Kong, July 22.)-The insurgents are gradually getting artillery into action against Pando, Santa Meseo and Malata. The fighting is desultory. The Spaniards have been driven from the trenches outside Malata and the insurgents are strongly entrenched near the walls of the forts. The insurgents have begun to bombard Malata fort and have struck the telegraph company's cable house. It is said on semi-official Spanish authority in Manila that the recent news from Cuba is "A vile English fabrication," that "in reality the Spaniards have been victorious," that "Admiral Camara's squadron has coaled at Singapore, and is expected here on July 25."

HONG KONG, July 22 .- Letters received here from Cavite, dated July 19, differ from the advices received direct from Manila, The former say the insurgents have been repulsed near Malatao and that they are now making less progress. There is also said to be much discussion among them, owing to alleged bribery upon the part of priests. Aguinaldo, it is further said, refuses to be subordinate to the United States. He does not seem to realize his position, as evidenced by his appointment of a cabinet, his declaration of independence and the formal hoisting of the insurgent flag. About the troops.
