General Weakness Abroad Causes a Decline in the Wheat Market.

EARLY ADVANCE IN THE DAY IS LOST

Onts Does Better, Going Three-Eighths to Half a Cent Higher -Pork and Ribs Decline.

CHICAGO, July 22.—Indications of an early movement of the new crop in Europe, tegether with general weakness abroad, caused a decline in wheat today toward the end of the session. Wheat started a trifle higher on light Argentine shipments and the slow movement of the new crop. The Liverpool markets showed little change, which, considering the weakness here yesterday, was deemed encouraging. Strength in corn and firmness of spot wheat sustained the speculative wheat. Later, however, the general weakness abroad and the near approach of new wheat deliveries in Europe started some selling here. This resulted in a steady decline until the early advance was more than lost Receipts at Chicago were sixty cars. The total of the primary western receipts was 427,000 bu. Exports from the Atlantic ports were equal in wheat and flour to 161,000 bu. Minneapolis and Duluth stocks of wheat were estimated to show a decrease for the week of 1,409,000 bu., and the visible was expected to decrease about 1,000,000 bu. Realizing in Industrial Specialties Causes a Sympathetic Decline. NEW YORK, July 22.—The stock market continued in the hands of the small boom traders today, who dealt mostly in industrialers today, who dealt mostly in industrial specialties. They advanced the prices of these early and this held up the standard railroad stocks. Realizing in the specialties later in the day caused a sympathetic decline in the railroads, carrying prices in many cases slightly below yesterday's close. Except where stocks were influenced by individual cases the total range of prices was lower and without significance. The duliness may be quite equally interpreted as indicating a disinclination to buy at the present level or an unwillingness to sell.

The international trade situation is still so obscure that speculators are not ready to commit themselves. Very little light was thrown on the probabilities by the day's grain markets, which were not very active and were hesitating in tone. There was weakness in the continental grain market and there was selling here, said to be for foreign account, indicating the trend of opinion that foreign ctops as well as our own are likely to yield largely. There were evidences of a pressure of funds seeking investment, but they manifested themselves in bonds rather than in stocks. The large demand for the new government is, which were traded in on the Stock exchange "when issued." had a favorable sympathetic effect all through the market. BUTTE, Mont., July 22,-(Special.)-A ledge of free-milling gold ore has been discovered on the south fork of the Flathead river, thirty-five miles from Kalispel and twenty-two miles from Coram. The ore is found in a great blanket ledge eight miles wide. A shaft has been sunk twenty-four feet without finding the footwall. The discovery was made by E. H. Seeley. Last fall placer gold was discovered near Burned Cabin. Acting on the theory that gold came down the river, Mr. Seeley started up stream to find the mother lead. He was rewarded when he found this tremendoùs ledge of quartz cement, carrying both gold and silver. At the point of discovery the river cuts the lead so that the vein shows on either side of the river. The ore is red hematite. The shaft has been sunk near the edge of the river to a depth of twenty-four feet. Average samples of the last six feet proved to be very rich, showing \$500 in gold and \$1.68 in silver to the ton. The ore is free milling. The river cuts this ledge for eight miles, and ore is shown up on both sides of the river. Up to date forty-four claims have been located, all on the same ledge. At Mr. Seeley's solicitation a number of Duluth, Chicago and New York men will arrive next week to examine the ledge with a view to organizing a company. The neighborhood has been organized into a new mining district, which is styled the Gold Reed Mining

Chickneaws to Vote Again ARDMORE, I. T., July 22.-(Special.) Governor Harris of the Chickasaws will is-

sue a proclamation calling a special election for August 24 to vote on the Dawes Chickasaw-Choctaw treaty, which failed to ratify about one year ago. This move is the outcome of a recent conference between the governors of the Chickasaw and Choctaw nations. It is the general belief that at this election the re-jected treaty will be ratified and become a part of the Curtis bill, as recently signed by the president. The general election of the Choctaw Nation takes place August 1, and that of the Chickasaws August 10.


