REGULATION FOR HUCKSTERS

City Council Intends to Bring Vegetable Peddlers Under Closer Control.

NEW ORDINANCE HAS BEEN PREPARED

City Attorney Wadsworth Has a Document Prescribing the Annual License and Conditions Ready to Present.

City Attorney Wadsworth, in accordance with the instructions given him by the city ouncil at its last meeting, has drafted an rdinance providing for the licensing of hucksters and fruit venders, which he will submit at the regular meeting of the city council in August. The ordinance is as fol-

An ordinance, providing for the licensing of hucksters and fruit verdors, fixing the compensation therefor, regulating the same and fixing penalties for the violation of

Section 1.—Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Council Bluffs, Ia., that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to peddle, hawk, sell or offer for sale upon the streets of Council Bluffs, Ia., any fruit, vegetables or produce without first obtaining a license therefor from said

Sec. 2.—That there shall be charged an-nually for each team or carriage used for the purpose of selling such fruit or produce the sum of \$50 and the same shall be collected from each person using or owning the same and that no license shall be issued for a shorter period than six months or for a less amount than \$25.

Sec. 3.—That for the purpose of issuing

licenses under this ordinance, the year shall be divided into two periods of six months each, beginning on the first days of February and August, respectively, of each year, and all licenses shall terminate on said dates, whether the holders thereof have held the same for the period of six months or

for a shorter period. Sec. 4.—Any person violating the pro-visions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon con-viction thereof shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$10 for each offense. Sec. 5.—Nothing in this ordinance

CITY WILL PRESS ITS CLAIM. Intends to Sue the Motor Company for

City Attorney Wadsworth filed in the superior court yesterday a trial notice and will insist on bringing to trial at the next term the suit of the City against the Omaha & Council Bluffs Railway and Bridge company for the collection of intersection taxes. The suit was commenced in 1891, but has from one cause or another been permitted to hang fire. In 1893 it was submitted on an agreed statement of facts which has, however, never been filed. The city's claim against the motor company originally amounted to \$8,705.33, but of this amount the company paid \$116 and was given a further credit for \$179.41, the cost of repairing a motor car which was run into by one of the hose carts of the fire department left the office and proceeded in the direction in September, 1891, leaving the amount as

now claimed by the city at \$8,409.92. The city's claim is for filling ditches on Avenue A, from Fourteenth to Thirty-sixth street; for replacing the pavement on Broadway torn up by the motor company when laying its tracks; for the intersection paving on Broadway from Twelfth to First street; for the intersection paving on Pearl and Main streets from Broadway to the Rock Island depot; for the intersection paving on Fifth avenue from Pearl to South Eighth street, and for the grading at in-tersections of Avenue A and Fifteenth to Twenty-sixth street inclusive. The principal amount of the claim is the intersection paving on Broadway, which is \$3,097.95.
