COUNTY SECURES CHEAP COAL

Makes a Contract for Anthracite at the Lowest Price Ever Offered.

The hard coal bids, opened at the meeting yesterday of the county commissioners for the court house and jail, would indicate a slight slump in the price of hard coal. The board got a bid the lowest of any price It has paid yet, and 25 cents lower than the price paid by the school board. This was the bid of Victor White, offering to furnish tons of Scranton, Pa., anthracite for \$6.50. Last year the board paid \$7.45. White therefore secured the contract. The other bids were: C. W. Holcomb, \$6.64; Nebraska Fuel company, \$6.85; Coal Hill company, \$6.62, and C. B. Havens, \$6.87.

No award was made for the seventy-five foot steel bridge over the creek on Center street. The bids were: C. E. H. Campbell, \$1,880; Canton Bridge company, \$1,875; Wrought Iron Bridge company, \$1,825; A. J Tullock, \$1,799; Farnsworth & Blodgett, \$1,850; Kansas Bridge company, \$1,765; J. R. Sheely & Co., \$1,749.50, and H. B. Mayo, \$1,939. That of the Canton Bridge was recognized as company lowest, but the matter will not be acted on until Tuesday morning. Bids for a culvert were also read, but it is the opinion of President Kierstead and Mr. Harte of the road and bridge committees, generally acquiesced in by the other commissioners, that a culvert would be more expensive, costing probably \$2,600 or more, and less satisfactory, besides being in constant danger of freshets, whereas a bridge will be a much better and safer investment as a road improvement.

For the grading, Cash Brothers received the contract for road 49 B at 8.7 cents per yard, and D. Hannon, 26 B, at 8.24 cents, they being the lowest bids according to the tabulation of the road committee.

Regarding the request of the parl board that the county board put a sewer in at the Twentieth street boulevard, above Ames avenue, the bridge committee reported that as this was within the city limits nothing could be approriated out of the bridge fund.

Bids were authorized for the repointing and painting of the county hospital. Claims amounting to about \$1,900 were ordered paid.

A resolution by Commissioner Ostrom, the chairman of the finance committee, was adopted appropriating \$1,000 to the county agricultural society for a poultry and live stock exhibit at the exposition. This was supported by a written opinion from the county attorney to the effect that the county could make such appropriation under the act authorizing the \$100,000 exposition bonds. A county premium list not to exceed \$1,000 was accordingly authorized, the premiums to be paid out of the exposition






