Wheat Has an Early Rally, but Closes Near Low Point of the Day. PRICES WEAKER IN THE CORN PIT

Provisions Rule Strong, Pork Advancing 2 1/2 Cents, Lard 10 Cents and Hibs 12 Cents—Oats in Demand.

CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—Expectation of big receipts, together with a declining corn market, today weakened wheat. After an early rally September closed 1 1/2c lower and December 1 1/2c lower.

Liverpool cables were rather disappointing and that, together with the weakness displayed by corn, started wheat lower. The receipts in the northwest were smaller and the markets in that quarter were firm.

There was a good business done in oats at lower prices. Corn was sold in the market at the time, but the losses were not nearly so large. May started unchanged at 27-5/8.
