Wheat Opens Up Strong and Active, but the Flurry Does Not Last.

DECLINE IN SEPTEMBER AND DECEMBER

Oats Are Strong Under Covering by Shorts and Advanced 3-8 of a Cent - Provisions Dull and Lower.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21 .- Wheat was strong today at the opening and weak at the close Heavy outside buying and large export sales were sustaining influences, but realizing by professional local holders proved too much for the market to stand up under. December closed at 1-8c decline and September 3-8c lower. Corn was easy, but lost only a small fraction. Oats were strong under covering by shorts and advanced 1-8@3-8c. | gee Provisions were dull and weak, closing 21/22 to 10c lower.

Wheat was strong at the opening. December closed yesterday at 63 3-8c, started today at 63 3-8@63%c and advanced in a very few minutes to 63 5-8@63%c. A slight reaction then took place, the price dropping to 6314 @ 63 3-8c, but the market almost immediately turned strong again and before mediately turned strong again and before selling became heavy enough to affect prices December had advanced to 63.7-8c. Sep-tember, though inactive, was also very strong, opening ½c higher at 67c and ad-vancing to 67½c. The main feature of the vancing to 67%c. The main feature of the strength was the heavy buying of a promi-nent St. Louis speculator, his purchases during the first hour's trading being estimated at 1,500,000 bushels. The character of the news was rather encouraging to buyers. Minneapolis and Duluth receipts were 912 cars, against 918 cars last week and 853 cars a year ago. Chicago receipts were 212 cars. Liverpool cables showed strength in that market and a strong continental demand for wheat was reported with prices higher. Duluth reported cash wheat in good demand and 4c higher. After the first hour's trading the market began to weaken. Offerings became heavier and general, Dearly all of the local helders who have been buying for several days putting wheat on the market. Later Liverpool cables showed some of the advance there lest. Atlantic port clearings were moderate, 285,000 bushels. Compared with yesterday's heavy clearings, this amount was not very encouraging. A gradual decline took place, December get-ting down to 63 3-8c. Here another buying flurry developed, sending the price back to 63 7-8c, but bidders at that price were deluged with offerings and the price quickly broke to 63 1-8c. The market fluctuated rapidly in a narrow range under active scalping, but did not develop any real strength again until near the close, when the announcement that seventy loads of cash wheat bad been sold for export railied the price suddenly to 63½c. It dropped again to 63½c and closed rather nervous at that figure. September sold as low as 66 1-8c and closed at 654½c.

Corn was dull and heavy. The market

showed strength at the opening, but later it was largely in sympathy with wheat. There was some changing from September to December. The country reported selling new corn to arrive in November and De-
