No Special Attraction, but Many People at the Grounds All Day Long.

OTHER BIG DAYS FOR THIS WEEK

Georgia, Finnish Children and Chicago Will Fill Out the Time with Full-Stead Crowds on Each Occasion.

A beautiful autumn day, such as are peculiar to only Nebraska and the great northwest, with a sky flecked now and then by a billowy white cloud, with the rays of which were tempered by the haze of Indian summer and made to look like a great ball of molten metal as it pursued its course through the atmosphere.

The heavy attendance of the week does not usually bring out well toward the close, but yesterday was an exception to the rule, notwithstanding the fact that there were no features carded for the day.

It was apparent early in the morning that there was to be a good sized crowd and the appearance of something, too, for long before noon more than the usual Tuesday attendance was in evidence.

Most of those who came were from a distance, a large number having come from Kansas, while there were many more from states still further remote.

Many who came brought their grips and luggage, indicating that they intended to stay for more than a day or two.

Right in this connection it may be said that early in the season most of the people who came to the exposition limited their stay to one or two days, but now it is the proper thing to consume from four days to a week in seeing the great show.

One of the interesting features of yesterday was to watch the 150 unfortunates from the Iowa Institute for the Feeble Minded as they passed through the grounds and buildings.

With many the mind was capable of grasping the situation and understanding the magnitude of the great exposition; with the major portion it seemed to be a dream or a visit to an enchanted land.

Several features that were scheduled were called off for various reasons. There was to have been a grand parade, but it was postponed on account of a slight misunderstanding between Captain Mercer and the exposition management.

The train bearing the Georgians left Atlanta last night and will arrive in Omaha over the Missouri Pacific at 12:25 Thursday afternoon.

The exercises will be held in the Auditorium at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning and will place President Wattles in the address of welcome.

It is probable that the party will number several hundred. Having their own train and being in a position to return when they please, it is likely that the members of the party will remain several days before going home.

During the afternoon the members of the Georgia party will lunch at one of the Viaduct restaurants, after which they will visit the different state and main buildings of the exposition.

The remaining days of the week promise much for the people who attend the exposition, as well as for the exposition. Today is Swedish-American day and it is anticipated that large numbers of the people of Swedish nationality will be in evidence upon the grounds.

Friday will be a day with a full card, as upon that occasion the Georgians will dedicate their building and turn it over to the exposition management.

Saturday, it is thought, will be one of the big days in the history of the exposition. It is Chicago day and every indication points to a large attendance from the big city on Lake Michigan.

PEACE COMMISSION MEETS

Holds a Private Sitting and Arranges Some Minor Details.

WITELAW REID TO ACT AS PRESS AGENT

Wife of Senator Davis Submits to an Interview and Gives in a Good Word for American Women.

PARIS, Sept. 27.—(New York World Telegram.—Special Telegram.)—The American peace commission held a private sitting today in one of the rooms of the hotel usually occupied by ex-President Eugenio and which will be the temporary office of the commission until room 20 is ready at Quai D'Orsay.

A meeting of an official nature with the press was assigned to Witelaw Reid. The character of the members of the commission is gradually developing. Secretary Day's studious manner is said to command respect from all present.

Paris, Sept. 27.—While the reception accorded to the United States Peace Commission here is all that could be desired, and while the French foreign office has taken great pains to treat the American delegates in precisely the same manner, it must be admitted that the general atmosphere of Paris, especially the diplomatic atmosphere, does not incline toward America.

It is the general impression here that the American commission has instructions to provide for the retention of Manila and the island of Luzon. "And for the commission to pretend to negotiate is a farce," said a prominent diplomat.

"America will put herself diplomatically in the wrong when she exceeds the provisions of the protocol, which both nations signed. I know the Spaniards have come prepared to make concessions; but if the American instructions are of an uncompromising nature, which is generally believed here to be the case, you can rest assured that the work of the commission will be futile.

PREACHER DECREED TO DIE

CARRISON TAKES RESPONSIBILITY

Buries His Point in Matter of Revision of Dreyfus Case.

PARIS, Sept. 27.—The discussion at yesterday's cabinet meeting was practically confined to the premier and his minister of justice, M. Brisson and Sarrieu. Replying to the latter's objections to a revision of the Dreyfus case, based on the negative character of the commission's report and the vote of the Chamber of Deputies affirming respect for a case judge, a case already passed upon by the courts, M. Brisson pointed out that the late Lieutenant Colonel Henry's confession of forgery changed the whole aspect of the case.
