JUBILEE RATES ANNOUNCED

Omaha Lines Give Out the Passenger Tariff for the Week.

NOT SO LOW AS HAD BEEN LOOKED FOR

Promise of Record Breaking Rates Not Fulfilled and Some Criticism is Engendered—What a Railroad Man Thinks.

A meeting of the passenger representatives of the lines was held at a meeting yesterday and decided upon reduced rates to Omaha during Peace Jubilee week, October 10-15.

That these rates are a signal disappointment to those interested in the success of the Peace Jubilee is most apparent. From the intimations given out from time to time by passenger men here it was believed that the Peace Jubilee rates would be the lowest ever made to Omaha, as the occasion is to be undoubtedly the greatest.

This opinion is entertained of the Peace Jubilee rates not only by outsiders, but by well posted railroad men who are not so close to the general passenger departments as they are.

Some Singular Excuses Offered. "It is amusing to anyone but a passenger man to hear the explanations the general passenger agents give for keeping the rates up. I heard a couple of them say that if lower rates were made their lines could not supply sufficient passenger equipment.

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PROUD OF AMERICAN NAVY

New Battleship Illinois Expected to Eclipse All Its Companions.

LARGER THAN ANY NOW IN THE SERVICE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Next Tuesday at 11 o'clock there will glide off the ways at the yards of the Newport Shipbuilding company the biggest, most superb and probably the most general service battleship in the United States navy.

Protection from Water. It will be protected against the entrance of water, in case of injury to the side, at the water line, by coffer dams extending for the length of the vessel on each side, and having a general width of three feet, with a total capacity of about 12,500 cubic feet for storage of fireproof iron pitch cellulose.

Battery Power. The main battery will consist of four thirteen-inch breech-loading rifles in high born balanced turrets, oval in shape and placed in the center line of the vessel, and fourteen six-inch rapid-fire guns.
