AS THEY FOUGHT AT MANILA

Major General Greene Makes His Report of the Battle.

PART PLAYED BY THE FIRST NEBRASKA

High Praise for the Troops Who Took Part in the Engagement—Stand Up Well Under Sharp Fire.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The report of Major General F. V. Greene, who commanded the Second Brigade, Second Division of the Eighth army corps at Manila, at the time of the battle there on August 13, has been made public. General Greene was then brigadier.

This brigade reached Manila Bay July 17, landed and established camp July 19-21, was attacked by the Spaniards July 31-August 1, 2 and 5; led the advance in the attack and capture of Manila, August 13. Our losses were sixteen killed and sixty-six wounded.

The resistance encountered on the 13th was much less than anticipated and planned for, but had the resistance been greater, the result would have been greater. Fortunately the great result of capturing this city, the seat of Spanish power in the east for more than 300 years, was accomplished with a loss of life comparatively insignificant.

General Greene's account of the events from the day of his landing up to the 13th of August, the date of the decisive battle, shows that his troops were constantly on the defensive, and that all of them were employed in skirmishes of greater or lesser importance.

"At 10:15 o'clock I sent forward the First battalion of the First Colorado along the beach and in the field on its right and left flank in the rear of the Cingalon and Paeo. They replied to this with volleys and the companies nearest the beach forded the creek, advanced through the water on the beach, turned the right bank of the trenches and entered Fort San Juan.

"Seeing the fort captured without resistance, I ordered the Eighteenth United States Infantry to move by the left flank over the trenches and along the road to Manila in column. As they advanced, however, a sharp fire was met from the woods near Cingalon and the Second battalion deployed to the right of the road in the formation for attack.

"Just as the advance of the Eighteenth Infantry and Third artillery began, the commanding officer of the reserve, which had been ordered up by the division commander, reported to me, and I directed them to follow by the beach and ordered the artillery to follow on the same line.

"Having made these dispositions, I moved forward rapidly by the beach and through the creek to the fort. A portion of the First Colorado was in the Spanish trenches replying to a fire from a second line of defense running along the road from Malate to Cingalon; the rest of the regiment and all of the California troops were in the houses a few hundred yards in front replying to this same fire from the flank.

"The First Nebraska and Eighteenth United States Infantry having now come up, I directed them to move forward, the former along the beach and the latter along Calle Real. The Colorado regiment was directed to protect the right flank from any possible attack from Cingalon and Paeo. The California regiment was already in advance on Calle Real; this way the advance moved through Malate from Strotte street, meeting a straggling fire from the direction of Paeo, but no serious resistance.

"After passing through Malate and Ermita, the open space at the Inmeta, just south of the wall of the city, was about 1 p. m. A white flag was flying at the southwest bastion, and I rode forward to meet it under a heavy fire from our right and rear on the Paeo road. At the bastion I was informed that officers representing the general staff and Admiral Dewey were on their way ashore to receive the surrender, and I therefore turned east to the Paeo road.

"On the morning of August 14 I was appointed senior member of the commission to arrange the details of the capitulation. The commission met at the Ayuntamiento (city hall) at 10 a. m. and concluded its labors and signed the capitulation at 5 p. m. on the same day."

General Greene expresses his appreciation for the services rendered by Captain T. D. Mott, aide-de-camp to the major general commanding and to the members of his own staff, Captain W. G. Bates, assistant adjutant general; Lieutenant Schuyler Schofield, aide-camp; Captain W. A. McCarty, assistant adjutant general; Major P. S. Bourne, surgeon United States volunteers (the latter, on special duty, not medical), all of whom were with him on August 23. They all carried orders under fire fortunately without any casualties.
