For the text of his sermon he took I Peter III, 10-11: For he that will love life and see good days, let him refrain his tongue from evil and his lips that he speak no guile; let him eschew evil and do good; let him seek peace and enmity II. Farmers Ship Their Own Grain. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—At a number of state dates in this special the farmers are shipping their own grain and have generally made a good profit by so doing. Bath reports that one farmer cleared \$117 on three carloads of wheat shipped above what he would have realized had he dealt with the local elevators and resident buyers. Another figure he is \$109 ahead on the same sized shipment. What is called the "elevator combine" argues against the proposition, but the farmers in the secret keep right on shipping.

Receipts on Land Rentals. CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—State Superintendent Parmelee, register of the State Board of Land Commissioners, reports the receipts for rentals of state and school lands for the ending September 30, 1898, as follows: For rental of lands, \$2,667.85; fees on leases, \$727; sale of lands, \$1,976.61. Total, \$5,371.46. This amount is an increase of \$11,000 over the rentals of the preceding year.

BLOOD FLOWS ON SUNDAY

Suicide and Attempted Double Murder at Shenandoah.

DISSOLUTE CHARACTER WIELDS A GUN

Walter J. Yates Shoots and Seriously Wounds His Wife and Her Female Friend and Kills Himself.

SHENANDOAH, Ia., Oct. 2.—(Special Telegram.)—At the town of Essex, seven miles northeast of this place, today about half past 12 o'clock occurred the attempted murder of two of its respected citizens, followed by the suicide of the assailant, Walter J. Yates, a dissolute character, who shot and seriously wounded his wife, severely wounded her friend and benefactor, Mrs. E. J. North, and then sent a ball through her own brain, causing instant death.

The story that started this crime is a sorrowful one and tells of a woman's confidence and love for one unworthy of it. On the 26th day of March, 1895, Walter J. Yates, aged 35, and Miss Sarah Findley, aged 20, were united in marriage in the living room of the latter's parents, the bride's mother, who objected to the drinking habits of her future son-in-law. Yates made well sounding promises and for two years after the marriage the home was a happy one. During this time a baby girl was born and christened with the name of Helen.

Three different times the wife left the home, unable to stand the abuse heaped upon her. As many times in his sober moments Yates prevailed upon her to return. During these separations Mrs. Yates made her home with her mother, Mrs. Findley, or else with a sister, Mrs. Charles Johnson, of Essex. Yates would visit her there, and about three months ago he, for the last time, persuaded her to live with him again. The reunion was followed by a three weeks' drunk, which caused the wife to again seek her Essex friends. This time she was given a home in the family of Mrs. E. J. North, the wealthiest land owner in Page county, and a woman who is noted for her benevolent deeds and the great interest she takes in temperance and kindred work.

Yates Grows Jealous. Mrs. North was aided in her philanthropic work by her son, William B. Carwin, and because of the interest the two had manifested in the trouble of Mrs. Yates, the husband of the latter conceived a jealousy of Carwin and last Thursday instituted a damage suit for \$10,000 against Carwin. He retained T. E. Clark of Clarinda as his attorney and on Friday evening, the suit charges Carwin with entanglement of the affections of Mrs. Yates. Mr. Carwin pronounces the charge false, and it is so regarded by all who know the parties concerned.
