

Germany buying of gold has slackened and New York and Russia are the chief buyers now. The Paris market is much exercised over the question of gold shipments to the United States. There was a rise in stering both at Paris and at Berlin, but the strength in Berlin exchange is due to "covering" purposes by Germany on a large mass of maturing bills which London will not re-new. Spanish exchange is also strong both on the rise on London discounts and on the advance of the Madrid gold premium.
