Omaha's Popular Congressman Addresses Dr. Sisson's Congregation.

WAR AND ITS RESULTS THE THEME

Incidents that Led to the Conflict and Good that Will Come from it

Congressman David H. Mercer occupied the pulpit of the Hanson Park Methodist Episcopal church last night and, for a layman, delivered a very good sermon, appropriate to the Peace Jubilee just closed.

The pastor, Rev. Fletcher M. Sisson, prayed that God would bless the American flag in the islands of the sea and that He would guide the peace commission to a right solution of the problem before it.

It was most fitting that our president should be here after the termination so happily of our late war, and, another thing, it chanced that the president made his first definite utterance as to the policy of our country with regard to the possessions which have come to it in this war.

Dr. Stewart Points Out What Advantage the Christian Has. Rev. George D. Stewart, D.D., of Fort Madison, Ia., one of the pastors of the First Presbyterian church in its early days, occupied its pulpit yesterday morning.

Dr. Stewart points out what advantage the Christian has in the presence of the war. He preached a sermon on the superiority of a Christian life to one that is of a worldly character, but before embarking upon it he took occasion to say many complimentary words for the exposition.
