BOAT FOR SURVEY PURPOSES

Especially Designed and Ship Equipped with Modern Instruments.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 .- A large, completely equipped modern government survey boat, The Pathfinder, will be launched at the Crescent shipyards, Elizabeth, N. J., early in December. It is the first vessel fitted out with all modern appliances built for the coast and geodetic survey in receat years, and is especially designed for service in Alaskan and Aleutian waters. It has a length over all of 196 feet, is of 1,000 tons capacity and has a steam radius of 7,000 miles. Its stock of instruments and scientific apparatus generally will be the most complete ever carried in a survey vessel, and its capacity will permit the carriage of sufficient stores to last throughout the season's service in the north. The vesael will be in readiness for the government by March and will start next June on its long cruise for Alaska. Superintendent Pritchell of the survey returned today from a trip which included an inspection of the work in progress on the vessel.

DETAILS OF PRESIDENTIAL JAUNT.

It is the expectation of the president that he will attend the dinner to be given by the Clover club, on Thursday evening. The president will return to Washington on Friday morning.

Richards. Vice President Hobart will join the party at Philadelphia on Thursday.

EXPORT TRADE OF PHILIPPINES.

Interesting Facts Furnished State Department by Consul Morris.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 .- Henry Morris, onsul at Ghent, has furnished to the State department as a matter of information a translation of a report made by the Belgian consul at Manila on the export trade of the Philippines during 1897.

During that year there was a great increase in the export trade, notwithstaniling the rebellion, the export of hemp alone amounting to nearly 44,000 pounds; copra extracts made nearly 48,000,000 pounds, atthough the business only dates from 1892. prior to which time almost all the copra came from the Carolines. The experts of sugar by Manila decreased nearly 92,000,000 pounds, but at Cebu the contrary was the case, and in the Vizayas and Negros Island the product of sugar was greatly developed.
