Assistant Secretary Meiklejohn Pays Tribute to McKinley's Ability.

ASKS VOTERS TO SUPPORT THE PRESIDENT

Mr. Meiklejohn Closes the Campaign with a Rousing Speech that Makes Mnny Friends for the Republican Party.

FALLS CITY, Neb., Nov. 5 .- (Special Telegram.)-Hon. George D. Meiklejohn addressed 600 residents of Falls City and Richardson county tonight in the court house. People came from Humboldt, Salem and Dawson to listen to him. He was preceded by Ellis Lewis, who presided at the meet-

Mr. Meiklejohn's address was non-partisan valm consideration of the questions being discussed by the different parties. The many farmers present were deeply interested at his reference to their avocations.

He said: "Compare the conditions of our country during the last fiscal year of the McKinley administration with that of the last fiscal year of the Cleveland administration. Our total imports were \$616,000,000, as against \$764,000,000, a decrease under the present administration of \$148,000,000. The total agricultural exports were \$840,000,000, as against \$682,000,000, or an increase of \$171,-The increase in exports of pork, including bacon, lard and hams, was \$21,-000,000; wheat, \$68,000,000; cattle, \$2,000,000. The total exports of all kinds were \$1,200,-000,000, as against \$1,032,000,000, or an increase of \$178,000,000.
