CONTROL OF THE NEXT HOUSE

CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEE CONFIDENT REPUBLICANS WILL HAVE A MAJORITY. RETURNS TO ASSOCIATED PRESS AT 12:30 P. M. INDICATE THAT 85 REPUBLICANS AND 109 DEMOCRATS ARE ELECTED TO THE HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—A m.—Chairman Babcock of the republican congressional committee has made the following statement to the Associated Press: "While I am satisfied that the republicans will control the house of representatives in the Fifty-sixth congress, it is impossible at this hour to indicate what our majority in the house will be.

"Thus far we have no definite returns from Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa or Kansas. Ohio has elected fifteen republicans and two districts seem to be in doubt. From Michigan the returns indicate a solid republican delegation. Representative Hawley is elected in Texas. Vincent Boering is re-elected in the Eleventh Kentucky district and Samuel J. Pugh is probably elected in the Ninth Kentucky. The election of George M. Davidson in the Eighth Kentucky is in doubt, with the chances seemingly in favor of his election. Advice from Maryland show that we have elected four republicans certainly. Nineteen members of the delegation from New York state, and perhaps more, will be republicans.

"The figures referred to by Mr. Babcock were contained in his prediction that the republicans would have a majority over all of about twenty-five. Democratic Prediction. Since early evening Secretary Kerr of the democratic congressional committee has been working on returns received at democratic congressional headquarters. To the Associated Press Secretary Kerr said at 1 o'clock: "The republicans have lost control of the house of representatives. We will have from 158 to 159 members and will organize the house of the Fifty-sixth congress. The majority of the opposition will be from fifteen to twenty-five congressmen in 1898, and perhaps more. Our advisers indicate democratic gains in some of the states, as follows: Alabama, 2; Illinois, 5; Iowa, 1; Kentucky, 3; Maryland, 2; Massachusetts, 2; Missouri, 2; New Jersey, 2; New York, 6; North Carolina, 2; Pennsylvania, 6; Virginia, 3; West Virginia, 3. This is a total of 37. One district in Delaware is doubtful, with the chances in favor of the democrats.

"In figuring a gain of three in Virginia Secretary Kerr includes two districts which elected democratic congressmen in 1896, who were unseated by the present house. According to New York Returns. NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Returns received in the Associated Press office in this city from all over the country up to 12:30 o'clock this morning indicate that 85 republicans and 109 democrats have certainly been elected to seats in the national house of representatives. The same districts two days ago returned a total of 87 republican congressmen and 89 democrats. Based solely upon the estimates in these districts, a republican loss of 20 and a democratic gain of 21 is indicated. These estimates concede to the democrats all of the congressional districts in Greater New York, and the Fifteenth. No elections for congressmen were held today in the states of Maine, Oregon and Vermont, members of the Fifty-sixth congress having already been elected in these three states several months ago.

FIGURES ON STATE ELECTION. Tabulated Statement of the Returns That Have Thus Far Come In.

Nebraska has been redeemed. From incomplete returns, which cover practically every portion of the state, the probabilities at the present hour are that Hayward's majority over Poynter will not be less than 5,000 and it is more likely to be as high as 8,000. The gains over the vote of last year are very uniform all over the state and not confined to any particular portion. Of 135 precincts reported there is a net gain for Hayward of 2,702. Should this ratio hold good his majority will be at least 8,000. Returns on the remainder of the state ticket are very meager, but those received indicate it has run fully up to the head of the ticket.

Large Mortgage Foreclosed. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Nov. 8.—In the United States circuit court today Judge Allen entered a decree of foreclosure on a mortgage against the Chicago & Ohio Railway company on a mortgage for \$300,000 executed in May, 1888, on which interest was defaulted.
