



curred the other day when one of the govrnment officials, in looking up the maps of the Caroline group, for one of which our peace commissioners value tried to bargain. opened an English atlas and found a whole galaxy of islands in the muidle of the Paeific credited to the United States. looked at the date of the atlas and found it was 1851. It was the Keith Johnson royal atlas, sancitioned by the foreign office at & generally considered among the most trustworthy in the world. On the map devoted to Southern Pacific a green line encircled a big slice of the ocean containing a lot of choice islands and the word "American" was printed across them in the same way that the Fiji islands were labeled British and the Marquesas were credited to the French,

In a foot note it was explained that "American" meant the United States. Within the circle were the well known and 435 pm b 4:45 pm b 5:30 pm b 2:20 pm scattered islands extending eastward as far as the latitude of the Sandwich islands. while the western boundary reached almost to the Carolines. The Phoenix and Union groups are quite important in size and population. They lie east of the Carolines and north of the Samons, are directly in the path of steamers from San Francisco to Australian ports and would be near the course of steamers from the Nicaragua canal to the Philippines. In the present trend of events any old island in the middle of the Pacific would be of some importance to the United States, but here was a lot of them which it was found had been credited to the United States for many years up to 1881, not only by trustworthy mapmakers,

but by authentic British publications. The question naturally arcse, how or when these islands ceased to belong to us, or whether as a matter of fact they had ceased to be ours. Did we really possess all these islands without knowing it, or had we simply forgot it? The matter was taken to the State department, where no one had any information on the subject that was ready. A little investigation, however, revealed an

nteresting history. It appeared that for more than fifty years hese islands were generally conceded as belonging to the United States by right of discovery and occupation. For many years our small merchant marine had considerable trade with them. American guano companies had works on them and derived large profits till about 1870, when the guano deposits apparently began to run out, though some of these works still remain. But while the government of the United States never denied its ownership of the islands, no record has yet been found to show that it ever officially affirmed it, though in many instances it has notified other powers that it could not recognize the right of others to any privileges in those waters not enjoyed by the United States. Like some European governments till within a score of years, we left these slands to their own governmental devices.
