

HAYWARD IS CHOSEN SENATOR

Elected by the Joint Legislative Session to Succeed William V. Allen. RECEIVES THE SOLID REPUBLICAN VOTE

REVIEW OF SENATORIAL FIGHT

Hayward's Supporters Resist All Efforts to Produce a Break in Their Lines—No Blood Shed.

LINCOLN, March 8.—(Special)—The contest for the United States senatorship began right after the fall election of 1898, as soon as it was certain that the republicans had elected a majority of the members of the legislature. The first name to be put forward by the newspapers for the post was that of Judge Hayward and the opposition was with quite general support from the people of the state, being the natural outgrowth of the enthusiasm of the state campaign just ended.

Soon after election day it was apparent that a strong organization had been formed for the purpose of pushing the candidacy of O. E. Thompson, a prominent business man of Lincoln, but who had hitherto been unknown in state politics. This organization did wonderful work in spite of a sentiment which was in the state against the candidate before the opening of the legislative session. It was evident that the fight must be between Hayward and Thompson.

For a long time there was little change in the candidates having a few supporters each in the joint convention held on in the hopes that a break in the forces of the leaders would result to their benefit. The prediction was often made that the Hayward support would go to pieces and that Thompson had twenty chances to win the support of the legislature.

At the first session of the caucus the vote differed very little from the result of the joint sessions. Subsequent ballots brought about no change and adjustments were taken from night to night until fifty-five ballots had been taken. On the evening of March 6 Mr. Thompson was defeated by a vote of fourteen in the joint session and seventeen in the caucus, withdrew from the race and his supporters distributed themselves among the candidates, none of them however, going immediately to Hayward.

Your attitude has commanded the respect and admiration not only of the people of Nebraska, but of the United States as well. It had been supposed by many that your caucuses would be broken and that there would be divisions in your council and the republicans confidently looked forward to a break in your ranks. You have signally disappointed these expectations on that part, and you have shown remarkable discipline and cohesion.

"It is now in my power to express in words my feelings of friendship and my gratitude for all you have done. The people of Nebraska have honored me beyond my merits, and I cheerfully take my station among the masses from whom I came, determined to discharge every duty to the great party of which I am a member as actively and faithfully in the future as I have in the past.

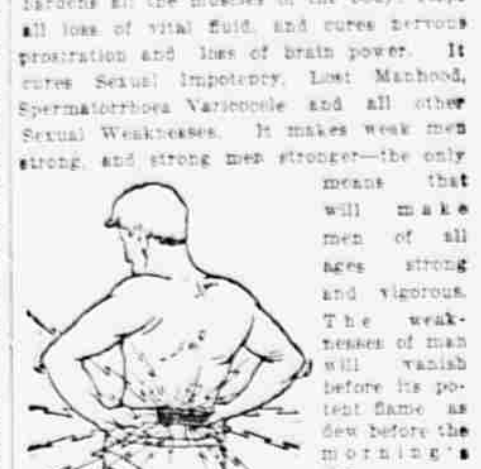
