Primary western markets received altogether 422,000 bu., compared with 432,000 bu. a year ago. Atlantic port clearances of wheat and flour were small, only 238,000 bu. Flour commission people reported the foreign demand better than for a month back. Bradstreet's report of the available made an increase of 578,000 bu., compared with 2,597,000 bu, decrease a year ago. The market weakened on that information and May wheat, which, previous to the announcement, had been bringing 68%,268%,c, dropped at once to 68%,266%,c. It was steadled again, however, in a few minutes by report from New York of forty-five boatloads being taken for export. The bears made a saveage drive about half an hour from the close and depressed the market for a minute or two to about the lowest figure made at the opening, but the closing price for May was 68%c.

Diminishing receipts and bad weather for hauling the grain to market strengthened corn. Another helping factor was a good cash demand for immediate shipment to the scaboard. Receipts were 305 cars. May opened a shade lower at 34%,234%c, declined to 31%c, then gradually improved to 34%c and closed with buyers at 34%,234%c.

There was only a scattered trade in oats and the market was influenced almost entirely by wheat and corn. Receipts, 26% cars, May begun a shade lower at 25%c. Firmness of corn had a stimulating influence on provisions, but the receipts of hogs were still too heavy for any confident buying. Changing of May contracts into later deliveries was the chief feature of the speculative business. May pork, unchanged at \$8,924, rose to \$8,971,69.00, and closed at \$8,05 seclers. The range in lard and ribs was inconsequential.
