

UNITED STATES TREASURERS.

List of the Men Who Have Held that Responsible Position. The germ of the treasury department, says J. Sterling Morton's Conservative, was planted when, on July 29, 1775, the conti-nental congress appointed two treasurers. The appointments were Michael Hillegas and George Clymer. The latter soon re-signed to accept his seat as delegate to the congress. Mr. Hillegas discharged the duties of treasurer until September 11, 1789. The treasury department was organized under the act of September 2, 1789. Strictly speaking, it was reorganized, for the department, under various names, had been in existence since 1775. The constitution went into effect March 4, 1789. Washington was inaugurated as the first president of the United States April 30, 1789. It will thus be seen that Mr. Hillegas was treasurer for nearly five months after the inauguration of Washington, and for nine days after the treasury department was organized under
