BID MADE FOR THE VIADUCT

Canton Bridge Company Offers to Pay \$550 for the Structure.

THIS IN ADDITION TO TEARING IT DOWN

Board of Public Works Will Recommend that the Offer Be Accepted -Other Business Before that Body.

When the Board of Public Works met restorday afternoon for the purpose of opening bids on the removal of the Six teenth street viaduct it looked as though the board would serve the city's interests better by doing the work by day labor and saving the old material, for the only bid submitted, that of August Hamel, asked the city to pay him \$2,000 for the work, in addition to the lumber saved. The board did, in fact, decide to recommend to the council that the city do the work, but with the afternoon mail came a bid from the Canton Bridge company, offering to remove the structure gratis and pay the city \$550 for the material in it. The board then decided to recommend that the Canton company's bid be accepted.

The board had also expected to open bids on the repairing of asphalted streets, but found that none had been submitted. C. E. Squires, agent of the Barber Asphalt company, in explaining why his company had not bid, offered the explanation why the other companies also failed to bid. He told the board that he had been advised by members of the council not to submit a bid, for the reason that the specifications for the work were irregular, not having been approved by the Board of Public Works before being sent to the council, although the latter body had approved them.

Upon investigation it was found that the specifications had in fact been approved, but that through some misunderstanding the record did not show it. The board then approved the specifications as an original action and will transmit them to the council again for approval. Bids will have to be called for again and the work will be delayed about two weeks, but as the work is to be paid for by special assessment it is imperative that every step have absolute

JUDGE GORDON GETS ANGRY

Objects to Remarks of Sanitary Officer Concerning His Rulings in Nuisance Cases.

The sanitary officers are wrestling with obstreperous citizens who, as they insist, must clean up around their places or the city will become the victim of a plague. A number have been arrested and released by Judge Gordon after promising to clean their places. When George W. Forbes was yanked into court for allowing garbage to decay around his flats at Seventh and Pacific streets, Sanitary Officer Maurice Suilivan lost his temper at the representations of the defendant and the action of the

"Never mind, Mr. Forbes, under the liberal rulings of this court you will be released," he remarked.

"You repeat a remark like that in this court and I will send you to jail," returned

the judge, indignantly. Officer Sullivan said no more, contenting himself with turning on his heel and walking out. He says he notified Mr. Forbes to

clean the place May 6 and the work has not been done yet. Among the cases he has brought into

court is that of E. L. Robertson, the Leavenworth street liveryman, who was discharged yesterday. The neighbors objected to the large quantity of manure around the building and in the alley. Officer Sullivan complains that he notified Mr. Robertson April 26 to clean up. This notice was repated May 11, and again May 17. Then notified to appear in court. The testimony of neighbors showed that several loads o offal and a few dead dogs lay around the place. Judge Gordon gave Mr. Robertson one week in which to clean up, and mean time visited the place himself. Several loads were hauled away, but the cleaning was not satisfactory to the sanitary officer, who says it is as bad as it was in the first place. When Mr. Robertson failed to appear at the end of the week Court Officer Johnson telephoned him to come in. He entered court yesterday, and Judge Gordon listened to his testimony and that of Mr. Bell, a complaining neighbor. Mr. Bell stated that an attempt had been made to clean the place, but it had not been successful. True, no odor remained, as the manure had dried thoroughly, but it still lay in the alley to the depth of the knee in passing through. Mr. Robertson said he thought the place was in a satisfactory condft on and the court apparently agreed with hin as he dis nissed the case.

The reason the officers give for complaining of the treatment of the court is that they are not able to make citizens to abate nuisances. If they have them arrested and the court discharges them, their time is wasted when they might be putting it to good advantage in looking after other lo-calities.




