Leading Citizens Urge the City Council to Take Action to Annul Company's Franchise on Union Avenue.

the controversy over the Fifth avenue

bridge. through a committee, representing all lasses of business, urged the city council o protect the interests of the city by taking action looking toward the annulment of the franchise granted to the Union Pacific for a ight of way on Union avenue.

The committee, through Dr. J. M. Barstow, presented a statement in which it was shown how the railway company had falled to abide by the terms of the ordinance granting it the franchise on Union avenue and the following resolution:

Resolved, by the city council of the city of Council Bluffs, Iowa, That the ordinance franchise and grant heretofore granted to the Union Pacific Railway company for ocupation of Union avenue, approved June 0, 1880, entitled "An ordinance granting right of way to the Union Pacific Railway company on certain streets," is hereby recinded, canceled and annulled by reason of the non-compliance of the Union Pacific Railway company with the provisions therein stated, and that all rights, privi-leges and immunities running to said Union Pacific Railway company, Its successors and assigns thereunder, are hereby canceled, annulled and withdrawn, and the city of Council Bluffs, through its city council, hereby declares all rights, privileges and immunities therein granted to said railway ompany, its successors and assigns forfeited and at an end.

Addresses in support of the city taking acific's franchise on the avenue were made by Dr. Barstow, E. H. Merriam, Frank Keys, H. A. Searle, I. N. Flickinger and Emmet Tinley. George F. Wright appeared for the railway company and in a review of the history of the franchise and matters in connection with it said it was a matter that would have to be determined by the courts.

The keynote of the several addresses made by the members of the business men's committee was that the city should stop temporizing with the railway company, as by so doing it prejudiced the rights of the city and acted as an estoppel against it ever taking action to recover Union avenue, which it was claimed had been forfeited by the Union Pacific by reason of it not living up to the terms of the ordinance granting it the franchise. The discussion asted several hours and the committee adourned without taking any action. The resoution presented by the business men will be brought up at the meeting of the city ouncil Monday night.
