REAGAN POINTS OUT A WAY

merce Law Might Require Amending to Make Such a

Course Legal.

ST. LOUIS, June 16 - Judge John H Reagan, chairman of the Texas Board of Railroad commissioners, appeared before the Interstate Commerce commission today and made a statement in regard to the alleged discrimination against domestic, and in favor of exporting handlers of grain and the alleged discrimination against the products of grain. It has been charged that railreads making export points have made special rates on grain for export and the commission received a protest from the handlers of grain for domestic consumption. It was also charged that there was discrimination against the products of grain.

The meeting today was largely attended by railroad men connected with western roads. Most of the morning session was devoted to hearing Judge Reagan, who appeared for those who are protesting against the alleged discrimination. After stating the situation as it appeared to him and in answer to a question as to the most practical remedy for the difficulty, Judge Reagan suggested that there should be a meeting of railroad men and shippers from all over the country, at which the situation could be thoroughly canvassed and some agreement reached which would be satis-

factory to all concerned. He thought it possible for the railroads and the shippers to reach such an agreement. Chairman Knapp asked if, in view of the legislation against rate agreements and the decisions of the courts upholding such legis-lation, it would be possible to make such an agreement valid before the par. "I am not wholly prepared to answer that question," replied Judge Reagan, "and I am inclined to believe it would be necessary before an agreement could be reached that we have some legislation on the subject. This would be necessary not only to make the agreement valid and binding, but also to fix penalties for its violation. Certainly the spirit of such an agreement is not opposed to the spirit of the laws against pools and trusts. Such an agreement would be for the benefit of the people and the shippers, as well as

the railroads. There is certainly some mildle ground upon which all can stand with equal advantage." Chairman Knapp thanked Judge Reagan for his valuable suggestions and the taking

of testimony from the railroad men on the

question involved was resumed.

ARMY REMARKABLY HEALTHY

Deaths from Disease in the Philips pines Number Only Three Hundred and Sixty-Four in a Year.

NEW YORK, June 16 .- The statements to the effect that men around Manila are dying like flies and that the War department has been compelled to suppress the regulation health reports which it was formerly customary to make public turn out to be gratuitously false, but serve the good purpose of bringing out the fact that the health conditions in the American army under General Otis are not only astoniehingly excellent, but have probably never been equaled in any army in tropical countries, says the Washington correspondent of the Tribune. Compared with that of last summer in Cuba the comparative immunity from death or serious illness of the American troops fighting outside of Manila seems little short of miraculous. From the landing of General Anderson's first military expedition near Cavite on June 30 last year up to the st weekly report from General Otis, dated June 6, there have been only 364 deaths from disease, although his total force has been 40,000 men. In the same period

sixty-nine men have died from wounds. In view of the notorious insalubrity of Manila and its environs these figures are almost incredible. They challenge contrast with the best English experience in Egypt or in India, and they surpass even the excellent conditions that exist in Cuba, where there is no fighting and the men are not exposed to the elements, but have comfortable garrisone. Men drowned or who died from injuries received otherwise than in battle are counted in the total of 364. This total is interesting compared with that of the men killed outright in action with the

Filipinos from February 4 to June 6, cover-ing the period of active hostilities. In those four months, with an average of 7,000 men engaged, the killed were 226. This great disparity demonstrates what improvement has resulted from the experience of the Santiago campaign, when 2,000 men died from disease and only 260 were killed. In fact, the health question in the Philippines has apparently lost its novelty, and, no question having been raised about it from this side of the ocean, no recent cable re-
