AT THE START OUTBREAK UNPROMISING

Business Picks Up a Little Later in the Session-Higher Prices Rule Provisions on Account of Heavy Shipping Orders.

CHICAGO, June 27,-Prospects of relief from the heavy burden of wheat at western points and an increase in the cash demand turned a weak market into a comparatively firm one today and resulted in a closing advance in the September option of 149% over yesterday. Corn and oats were firm, corn closing 14,00% higher and oats 1% higher. Provisions advanced 21,005c. The action of wheat at the opening and for a short time after was anything but encour-aging to the bulls. There was the same story of weak English and continental markets and the same reports of heavy receipts at primary points that caused wheat in the past week to break 5c. The opening in September was at 73%267%c, compared with yesterday's closing price of 742744c. The liquidation for a time was heavy, holders of July options being especially prominent in the selling and a further decline to 73%c took place. A challenge of a juror for cause raists

C. J.
1. A challenge of a juror for cause raises a question which is to be decided by the trial judge from a consideration of all the facts developed during his examination and any circumstances which tend to enlighten upon the matter and of these are the appearance and actions of the juror while undergoing the examination.
2. An opinion or impression of a juror formed from reading newspaper reports and hearing keneral rumors, of none of which he has a settled belief, but expresses rather a disbeller or disregard, is hypothetical and does not disqualify him if he also states that he can render a fair and impartial verdict based solely upon the evidence and wholly without the interference of such opinion or impression.
3. The determination of the trial judge m the decision of a challenge of a juror for cause will be sustained on review if not clearly wrong.
4. A charge of an assault with intent to murder is of a crime of which the intent is an essential element and its proof as implementaties.
5. Where there is no bodily intury or results.

dispensable as the proof of the act which it accompanies. 5. Where there is no bodily injury or re-sult from the act or assault, the intent may not be presumed from the act, but as the intent is a process of the mind and neces-sarily hidden or secret it may not be sus-ceptible of proof by independent evidence, it may be gathered or drawn from all the case inclusive of the act and is a matter of fact for the consideration and decision of the jury.
