New York Central Consolidations.

NEW YORK, June 29.—The directors of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad company will meet tomorrow to formulate a proposition to the Boston & Albany stockholders looking to a lease of that railread for a long term of years. The proposition to be drawn up tomorrow embraces only overtures to the Boston & Albany and nothing will be done at this meeting about drafting propositions to other lines which Union Pacific and the Oregon Short Line are maturing rapidly, it is said, and may come to a focus almost any time. The Big Four and the Chesapeake & Ohio are said to be included in the scheme of consolidation and in due time and under proper conditions will merge into the New York Central.

The sales of grazing land are enormous and indicate to some extent the growth that is taking place in the industry of raising live stock on the range. Wednesday the Standard Meat and Live Stock company of Denver, which has already bought many large tracts of land, closed another deal for 7,000 acres in Wyoming adjoining its previous purchases. The same day the Echo Land and Stock company purchased 5,000 acres in Utah. This company has also made previous purchases. In addition to these two sales smaller purchasers took 1,200 acres in Kansas and Nebraska.

Scientists Seeking Wyoming. The Union Pacific fossil fields excursion to Wyoming is creating considerable interest. Already some of the most eminent scientists in the country have signified their intention of accompanying the expedition. The party of scientists will leave Laramie July 29. The main direction will be northwest. It will stop in some of the richest cretaceous invertebrate collecting grounds and will give students who desire to collect fossil plants ample opportunity to do so. It will also make a special feature of structural geology, will visit the famous dinosaur fields and will terminate its journey at the Grand Canon of the Platte. The expedition will continue forty days.

Health Commissioner Spaiding has determined that some of Omaha's physicians, who habitually violate the law in regard to reports of births and deaths, shall be made to suffer for their negligence until a radical reform has set in. Receives Its Portion of the Road Fund from the County-Grading Bids Rejected.

The Board of Park Commissioners held its regular monthly meeting yesterday afternoon. The finances of the board were discussed briefly and found to be in the best of condition, enough funds being available to carry on all work contemplated without delay. The report of the city treasurer showed that he had received from the county treasurer \$8,500, being the board's share of the road fund.

All bids on the grading of Central boulevard were rejected because they were too high. The board decided to advertise again for bids on the grading, and also for bids on the construction of a bridge in the boulevard spanning the gulch at Eighteenth street. The grading, which will be advertised, is between Tenth and Thirteenth, and will open up the connection between Hans-

com and Riverview parks. May Not Be Unceremoniously Dumped late the River or Shot After Saturday,

Owners of dogs are wondering just what effect the new law making dogs personal property, which goes into effect July 1, will have on the city ordinances requiring dogs be tagged and authorizing the city dog catchers to take them up and impound them for redemption. When the dogs become per sonal property it will not be lawful for the police to kill them, although there seems to be no reason why the dogs may not be taken up and impounded just as stray cows or horses are. The probability is that the canines will be rounded up as usual and that their owners will have to redeem them by paying the tax and putting the tags on hem as a sign that the tax has been paid. The city poundmaster, however, will have his kennels overflowing with dogs if he has to hold every one taken up until the owner appears to claim it. Such, it is understood will be the effect of the new law, if it has any effect at all.

The number of dogs on which the tax has been paid and for which tags have been issued has just passed the number for last year. Up to Wednesday evening 2.810 tags had been issued, two more than last year's number. It is expected that the new law will decrease the number issued during the rest of the season somewhat, as the owners of dogs may not have to put tags on them in advance to prevent their being killed by
