Scalpers' Ordinance Sustained. The second effort of the ticket brokers to defeat the ordinance recently passed by the city council failed yesterday when Judge Keysor refused to grant the injunction asked for by Hugh Testard to prevent the authorities from interfering with him in his business in the porch of a down town hotel. In this case the plaintiff asserted that the ordinance was the result of a conspiracy on the part of the regular brokers and the city officials to drive him out of business. After hearing the evidence the court decided that the ordinance is valid and that it may be enforced. This is the second defeat of the brokers, as Judge Baker sustained the ordi nance in the habeas corpus case brought by another broker some time ago.
