# COMMERCIAL AND FINANCIAL Rally in Foreign Markets and Estimates Stopped the Decline.

# PRICES ARE SENT UP SEVERAL POINTS

Wheat is Firm at the Opening-Corn is Strong and Closes at the Top -Oats Are Firm and Higher.

CHICAGO, Aug. 2 .- A rally in foreign markets and estimates of a considerable smaller spring wheat crop than a year ago stopped the decline in wheat today and sent prices to a point % 0% above yesterday's close, Coarse grains were also strong, corn closing %c higher and oats %c higher. Provisions advanced 25266c.

Wheat was firm at the opening, although interest in the market showed but little increase. Damaging hall and rain storms were reported all over the northwest, the area affected being placed as high as 500,000acres, while complaints of drouth also came from some sections of the wheat beil. Northwest receipts continued to fall off and the proportion of new wheat arrivals was much smaller than a year ago. Minneapolis much smaller than a year ago. Minneapons and Duluth reported 237 cars, figainst 355 last week and 75 a year ago. Chicago re-ceipts were life cars, thirteen of contract grade. Of the local receipts forty-four cars were new wheat. A year ago they were about 100 cars. Liverpool also showed some advance, due to unfavorable weather in England and parts of the continent. Sep-tember opened 4,0% chigher at 60%060/2c, with some demand from shorts. The mar-ket eased off shortly afterward to 60/90 65%, but soon become strong again under a continued moderate demand, advancing to 69%260% a Reported absence of cash de-mand caused prices to waver for a time, every little advance bringing out long wheat and encouraging short selting. The large clearances from Atlantic ports, however, a total of nearly 900,000 busnels from all points, caused considerable skepticism as to the entire truth of the reported absence of export demand, and shorts became heavy buyers. Closing cables were higher. A fam-me was said to be imminent in India on ac-count of the absence of the usual monsoon rains. The market bocame active and ad-vanced steadily to the close. A feature of the news was the estimate of a crop export putting the spring wheat yield at 239,000,000 bushels, or 36,000 obushels heaving or port with previous crops was also put at 160,000 bushels. bushels, or 35,000,000 bushels less than previ-ous estimates. The European shortage com-pared with previous crops was also put at 160,000,000 bushels. The weather was favorable and primary receipts were 50 per cent larger than last year, but clearances were largo and the cash demand was good. The sea-board reported 210 loads taken yesterday. Local receipts were 18,94-526 cars-and the advance in freight rates was expected to result in a still further reduction. Shorts took the new crop futures freely on com-plaints of hot weather from Kansas. Sep-tember ranged from 30c to 30%c and closed %c higher at 20%26. Oats was firm and higher on a small amount of trading. There was a fair cash demand at higher prices and the seaboard reported moderate export sales. There was considerable changing from September to May at 1%@2c spread. Receipts were 255 cars. September ranged from 19 to 19%20 19%c and closed %c higher at 19%c. Provisions were fairly active and irregu-lar. The market atter a steady opening broke sharply on rumors of further out-breaks of yellow fever. 
