SHOWERS OF STARS THIS MONTH.

in the Skies During August. There are two features for which Augus s distinguished—one the dog days and the other the first of the series of falling stars,

relates the New York Times, As we look up into the heavens to particular stars there are certain tints connected with the prominent ones, the named stars, as we popularly call them, that aid us in distinguishing them from others. These delicate tints can of course convey to us but a very imperfect idea of their real coloring. In passing from our latitude, with its peculiar meteorological conditions, to the impid regions of the tropics, the colors of the stars are accentuated, and the sky becomes a veritable casket el precious gems. Antares, Pollux, Aldebaran, Betelguese and the planet Mars shine like rubies, Polaris, the North Star, Capella, Castor, Arcturus and Procyon are veritable celestial topages, while Strius, Vega and Altair are diamonds of the first water, collpsing all others by

their dazzling whiteness. The speed of the sun in August increases materially as the time for reaching the equinox approaches, and we find that at the month's close nine and one-half degrees of northern declination have disappeared. The intense heat of the month is greatly modified by the lengthening nights. which are gradually taking unto themselves

many minutes from the light of day. The August moon is new on the 4th, reaches the phase of first quarter on the 14th, is full on the 20th, and passes into last quarter on the 27th. It occults Mercury on the 7th, and we would have a charming picture to gaze upon if 'twere not for the fact of the planet's invisibility on that occasion. Almost all of the conjunctions between moon and planets take place this month between the new and the full moon, so that we have the majority of the wanderers as evening stars.

We miss so many pleasant tableaux in not being able to see this magnificent planet, whose approaches to the moon are, for this month at least, closer than almost all the other planets. company of the morning stars and remains there the rest of the month. We sometimes complain of the heat of the sun; but what is our luminary compared with the dazzling furnace of Mercury? It is as if ten suns together darted their rays on our heads at noontime. So that if any Mercurian drops down upon us he'd fancy himself in the Arctic even were he to bring up in Central Africa or hottest Asia. Mars comes to our meridian in the middle of the afternoon, come three hours or so after the sun. He is in the constellation of the Lion. Unfortunately he is very small at present and his size diminishes daily, but his clear, steady light still admits of his being distinguished in the setting of brilliants surrounding him. Jupiter's approach to the sun can be noticed very easily now, for we find him at sunset further and further down in the western side of the heavens. We shall hold onto him, however, until November, as he does not cease to be an evening star until

his conjunction with the sun on the 18th of that month. Uranus reaches the position of quadrature with the sun on the 27th, and still ranks among the evening stars. He is in the constellation of the Scorpion, and comes to his

highest point on our meridian shortly after o'clock in the evening. Saturn and the moon are in fairly close proximity on the 16th. This will really be the most picturesque of the monthly conjunctions, and it is unfortunate that the planet is not as large and as brilliant as we
