

Papers on this subject are to be read by Mayor J. J. Williams of Memphis, who has given the garbage question a most careful and practical investigation; Dr. William C. Woodward, health officer of Washington, whose experience in this particular field of work has admirably fitted him for a most instructive discourse; and H. J. Gondon, editor of City Government, New York, who has the information necessary for a fair elucidation of the various systems of garbage collection and disposal used in American cities. After the reading of these papers there will be an open discussion of the subect, to be led by Dr. Conrad Diehl, mayor of Buffalo, Mayor McGuire of Syracuse, Mayor Maybury of Detroit, Alderman T. D. Fitzgerald of Albany and Alderman D. P. Whenlan of Richmond, Ind., all of whom

have given the garbage question especial study. The next topic on the program is "The Special Assessment System for Public Improvements," with papers by Mayor Johnson of Fargo, N.
