

NEW AIR-COOLING MACHINE. Simple Device for Lowering the Tem-perature of Rooms. a 2:45 pm

A machine has been built on novel principles for cooling the air of houses and apartments. It differs from the refrigerating machines now in use, which convert mechanical energy into heat, abstracted through the medium of liquefied gases, in that it depends on utilizing the great latent heat of evaporation of water. It is not intended for heavy refrigerative work, but for cooling at maximum efficiency over the range of 10 to 25 degrees Fahrenheit, required to keep a room at comfortable temperature on a hot summer day. To furnish the forced blast which provides both the air circulation and the chilling effect, all that is required is a little electric motor blower. This evaporates the water, which is distributed in a capillary film, so effectively that 10,000 cubic feet of air per hour can be cooled to about 68 de-grees Fahrenheit. There is an automatic adjustment which keeps the temperature at any desired point and at any desired degree of humidity. The water can be taken from the local supply and current from the nearest available source. The apparatus requires no more attention than a common fan motor, and can readily be set up in sick rooms or hospitals, where such an ap-
