Withdrawni of Milwankee Line from Association Leaves Them at a Disadvantage on Chicago. Minneapolis Business.

Affeirs in the Western Passenger association are in a chaotic state and a break away from the association of lines which are present members is expected at any time. Such action will be the direct result of the withdrawal of the Milwaukee. It was at first believed that the action of the Milwaukee would cause the three lines which have persisted in remaining outside the association to come to time and apply for membership immediately, but this has not as yet been done, nor is there prospect of its being brought about in the immediate future for the reason that the outside lines demand more than the association feels

itself able to grant. Ever since the Milwaukee withdrew there has been much curiosity as to what action the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha and the Burlington lines would take. These roads are in the field for business between Minneapolis and Chicago just as actively as is the Milwaukee and they aver that the Milwankee was not suffering more than they because of the persistent refusal of the Chicago Great Western, Minneapolis & St. Louis and Wisconsin Central to join the association. But since it has taken the initlative and gone into the field for business "without fear or favor" the Omaha and Burlington roads realize that they are in rather an unenviable position, with four of their competitors engaged in a rate war, and they necessarily kept in the background, unable to enter into the competition because of their membership in the association.

The first authentic statement regarding the attitude of the Omaha road regarding the present status of affairs in the Western Passenger association comes from an official of the passenger department and it is construed to mean that but a short time will elapse before the Omaha will free itquoted as saying:

"The withdrawal of the Milwaukee leaves association of the Chicago lines having connections in St. Paul and Minneapolis and intermediate territory. There is no prospect at present that a reorganization will be effected. A proposition has been made to the lines which caused the break to reorganize, but they have demanded more than the lines of the association see fit to This makes the situation serious, as there is no doubt that unless the Milwaukee and the other three lines now out can be persuaded to accept a compromise and rejoin the association it will go to the An effort is being made to preserve the association and secure a satisfactory adjustment of difficulties in a reorgan-The prospect of success is remote.

"The Chicago-St. Paul lines would be on comparatively the same basis if all were out of the organization, and the benefit gained to our road and the Burlington by remaining in under the present situation is insignificant. No action has been taken yet, but the present state of affairs cannot continue long. Either the roads now out enust rejoin the association or it will be come a thing of the past. The Milwaukes would probably re-enter if the other roads would take the same action and abide by agreements. Past experience does not justify the assumption that they would."

COMMITTEE COMPLETES ITS WORK

Transmissouri Railroad Officials Recommend Plans to Other Lines. After a session lasting for two days, the Transmissouri committee of the Western Passenger association concluded its sessions at the Millard hotel Friday afternoon and the representatives of the roads belonging to the association from abroad left for their

The principal matter under discussion by the committee was the question of military rates. Transmissouri roads are vitally interested in this. The movement of the several new regiments now being formed will naturally affect them, as the soldiers must be transported over their roads to the Pacific coast preparatory to embarking for Manila. Owing to the fact that a few western roads were not represented, the committee was unable to come to any definite conclusion. All of the members of the association present agreed that the best plan that could be adopted would be on the basis of an equitable distribution of the business and a uniform rate. Such a proposition was agreed upon, but before it can become operative it must receive the sanction of the Missouri Pacific, Rio Grande Western, Colorado Midland and the other roads which failed to have representatives present at the meeting. Consequently, the result of the meeting of the committee goes to all the western roads in the form of a recommendation, the nature of which was not divulged, because it has not yet been definitely adopted by all of the lines which would enter into competition for the military traffic. It is the general opinion, however, that the plan of the committee will be endorsed by every
