PARIS, Sept. 11.—Except for slight street disturbances tonight, Paris has remained unexpectedly quiet, but this condition of affairs is not likely to continue. The long, heavy rain yesterday, combined with the fact that the leaders of the opposing parties were at Rennes prevented any organized demonstration. Now, however, they are beginning to see the want of logic in conceding "extenuating circumstances" to a convicted traitor, a concession which excites doubt as to the strength of the case

against Drevfus. Moreover, public opinion is being sobered by reading the comments of the world at large and by the prospect, however remote, that the exposition will be boycotted, which will mean the loss of millions of france to the country.

There is little doubt that the trial of the Derouledists next Monday, at which it is asserted sensational evidence will develop, and the reopening of the Chamber of Deputies will be the signal for fresh troubles. At present both parties are taking breath but the latent animosities are undimin-

It is estimated the late proceedings have cost the Dreyfus party at least 1,500,000 france. They do not intend to let matters rest and rumors are revived of the impending arrest of General Mercler. He declares he dos not care what happens, being satisfied that he has done his duty.

It is estimated also that President Loubet opposes such an extreme course as prosecuting Mercier or the other generals. He is rather inclined to a conciliatory policy extending even to a pardon for Dreyfus.

M. Demange has been blamed for conceding so many points in his speech, but it appears he did so in the hope of winning another waverer among the judges, who, however, finally joined the majority on condition that the verdict would be accompanied with the proviso as to extenuating circumstances.

The dossier of the Rennes court-martial proceedings arrived here tonight for submission to the military court of revision consisting of General Marcillo, Colonel Courbobosse, Lieutenant Colonel Lagrene, Major Copp and Major Allard.

It is said that Mathieu Dreyfus intends to supplicate Emperor William to order the publication of the documents enumerated in the bordereau.

LINCOLN, Sept. 11 .- (Special.) - The first day of the twenty-third annual reunion of the Nebraska department of the Grand Army opened at the fair grounds near Linceln this morning with an almost unpreecdented attendance of veterans. The arrivals today were more numerous than yesterday and still larger numbers are expected tomorrow.

This afternoon the first formal meeting of the Grand Army was held in the large assembly tent. The program opened with an address of welcome to veterans from other states by Governor Poynter, followed by an address of welcome to the city by Mayor Winnett. On behalf of the Nebraska department Quartermaster J. C. Bowen responded, followed by Major McClay of the Third regiment, ex-Governor Holcomb and General Gage.

In the course of his address Governor Poynter said the nation was marked by three spirits. First, the spirit of liberty which had been made profitable by the veterans of 1776; second, the spirit of equality, the result of the conflict of '91, and third, the spirit of fraternity, which was the outgrowth of the Spanish-American MEETS VOLUNTEERS war. The union of these three forces, he remarked, makes the greatest country in the world.
