Three-Million Increase to the Visible Brings Chicago Wheat Lower.

PROVISIONS CLOSE WITH LITTLE CHANGE

Corn and Oats Remain Stationary-Closing of Three Million Bushels of Wheat by One Firm Affects Market.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 .- The addition of over 8,000,000 bu, to the visible supply of wheat overshadowed in influence everything else teday and caused a decline of %21%c. Corn and oats were firm, corn closing unchanged and oats 46'4c higher, Provisions closed

without material change.
Wheat opened at an advance of 1400 to from Saturday's closing price, with a good general demand at those figures. The cause of the advance was the strength of cables on account of the critical South African situation and some rather liberal covering by shorts was done during the first half hour's trading. The demand was readily Supplied, but though plenty of bearish news was at hand in regard to crop movement and seeding conditions the market held up well until near the noon hour. After the first rush of buyers had been accommodated trading became dull and prices kept within a narrow range, December easing off slightly from opening figures. September in the meantime was decidedly strong on a narrow amount of trading. Very little was offered for sale and elevator people were moderate bidders, prices in consequence advancing sharply early. Before noon December began to weaken, partly on account of the weakness in Wall street, but principally on the indications of an enormous increase in the visible, the figures of which were finally put at 3.111-000 bu. The heavy selling was done by one firm supposed to be in the way of liquidation of a long line. Most of the wheat was offered at under Ite for December. It was estimated that fully 3,000,000 bu. was disposed of by this firm and it had considerable effect on the market. General rains were reported throughout the west and southwest and conditions were reported as now favorable for fall seeding. Primary receipts were heavy. 1,688,000 bu., compared with 1,489,000 bu. a year ago. Minneapolis and Duluth receipts were 1,422 cars, against 1,238 last week and 1,933 a year ago. December ranged from 25%c to 25%gr25%c and closed unchanged at 35%c, selling as high as 33%c.

Oats was firm and fairly active. There was a large cash demand, at least 250,000 bu. being worked all rail. Shorts were good buyers of both September and December and prices ruled slightly higher at 21%c.


