New Through Fast Train Between Chicago and Coast a Certainty.

TIME IS TO BE REDUCED TO THE MINIMUM

Northwestern, Union Pacific and Southern Pacific Will Run Trains Between Chicago and San Francisco in 72 Hours.

The assurance is officially given that the new fast through train from Chicago to San Francisco to be operated over the Chicago & Northwestern, Union Pacific and Southern Pacific systems will without fail placed in service October 15. Officials of the three great systems interested in this matter have been in conference in Salt Lake for several days and it is understood that the schedule of time has been agreed upon and everything definitely settled. General Passenger Agent Lomax, one of the representatives of the Union Pacific, has not returned from Salt Lake, but is expected at his office today. General Manager Dickinson and Mr. Buckingham, superintendent of transportation, returned yes-

The exact details of the new arrangement for the running of the fast train have not been given entire publicity, but it has been definitely agreed upon that the new train will be an addition to the present passenger train service and will be established both east and westbound between Chicago and San Francisco. The plan is for the westbound train to leave Chicago daily about 6:30 p. m., arriving in San Francisco about 5:50 p. m. the third day, and the east bound train leaving San Francisco about S a. m., arriving in Chicago about 9:15 p. m the third day. This will make the run between Chicago and San Francisco in approximately seventy-two hours,

This innovation in western railroading will be watched with interest. That I will prove a success there can be no question. ### Interesting Rumor.

In Salt Lake an interesting rumor regard ing the new plan was current to the effect that the Southern Pacific actually dictated the whole schedule to the officers of the Union Pacific and the Northwestern. It is asserted that the Southern Pacific went into the conference practically agreed upon its schedule, showing a reduction between Ogden and San Francisco of about four hours, but refusing to consent to it unless an additional through fast train should be placed The Union Pacific, it is said, would have been pleased to arrange a schodule by which one of its present through trains should be put through on better time and went into the conference considering a new train merely as a possi-

It is altogether likely that this move of the Northwestern, Union Pacific and Southern Pacific will result in the lessen ing of time on all the railroads operating between Chicago and the coast. The Rio Grande Western, one of the feeders at Ogden of the Southern Pacific, will be compelled to adopt a schedule of faster runing in order to compete with the Union Pacific for business to Ogden. But to do this a schedule conforming with any changes which it may make will be necessary on the part of its conections, which are the Burlington, Rock Island, Denver & Rio Grande and the Santa Fe. If all of these roads enter into the spirit of the thing and begin reducing their time there will be a repetition of the tests made last year when the railroads were racing against time with the government mail contract hung up as an incentive.

### BURLINGTON STANDS PAT

Boycott by Kansas City Merchants Will Not Change the Road's Rate.

The persistent efforts of the Burlington to reduce the Omaha-Kansas City differential on packing house products to 3 cents has caused the Kansas City merchants to unite on a boycott against that road. While the Burlington's rate only favors packing house products all classes of Kansas City merchants are concerning themselves on the ground that this road might discriminate against other interests at any time.

Officials at the Omaha headquarters say this will effect no change in their effort to maintain the 3-cent differential. has now become a fight," said a Burlington man yesterday, "between this road and all Kansas City. It is wonderful how little interest Omaha is taking in this matter. The Burlington has undertaken to favor this city and it intends to continue certainly indicates confidence on his part in the fight."

Burlington's Annual Statement. CHICAGO, Oct. 2.- The annual report of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad was made public today. Gross earnings for the year were \$43,389,424, as compared with \$42,800,162 last year. Operating expenses were \$28,253,959, an increase of \$325,579 over 1898, and \$5,238,370 were paid in dividends, leaving a surplus for the year of \$1,489,929. The report gives the total mileage of the sytem as 7,249, an increase of ninety-nine

miles over last year. Low Rates to Chicago.

The Milwaukee, Burlington, Rock Island and Northwestern railroads have agreed upon a one-way rate of \$7.75, or round-trip rate of \$12.75 between Omaha and Chicago for the present week. These low rates are made on account of the Chicago autumnal festivities and each of the roads give a ave-day limit on the tickets sold.


