Corn Makes Another Display of Strength and Closes Higher.

WHEAT AND OATS TRAIL ALONG IN ITS REAR

Shorts Are Nervous Regarding South Africa and Take in Wheat Lines in Spite of Bearish News.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26 -Corn led the proceswion on 'change today and closed with a general buying movement, induced by the growing conviction that this year's crop as been greatly overestimated, caused the unturn. December wheat closed with a vere dull and closed practically unchanged. Wheat opened steady and scored a %c adfirst hour's trading. Early news was generally of a bearish cast, but shorts were ervous over the situation in South Africa and commenced covering from the start, The strength in corn also encouraged buying and as offerings were scarce the up-turn was easily accomplished. December opened isc higher at 70% 50.00% and ad-vanced to 71%c. At the latter figure, how-ever, a good deal of long wheat was thrown ever, a good deal of long wheat was thrown on the market and a reaction to 70%37705xc followed. The latter part of the Session was extremely dull, with the prices barely holding at 70%971c and finally closing with buyers at 70% Indications of an increase of 1,500,000 bushels in the domestic visible during the week and reports of complete cellef in the drouth-stricken sections had a depressing influence after the early trading. Spot demand was poor. Chicago received 106 cars, six of which graded contract. Minneapolls and Duluth got only 476 cars, compared with 700 for the corresponding day a year ago. Total western primary receipts were 955,000 bushels. Atlantic port clearances in wheat and flour equaled 490,000 bushels.

Corn was strong and active. A report by an authoritative statistician that the early estimates of this year's yield must be materially reduced owing to disappointing husking returns was the chief buying motive. The market advanced steadily until near the close, when selling by shippers and profit-taking caused a slight reaction. Cash demand was slack. Receipts, 415 cars. December opened 3c higher at 1126713c, sold sparingly at 315c, advanced to 325c, and closed at 32c.

Outs was dull, but held steady in sympathy with corn. The principal trade consisted of changing from December to May, with the result of a slight narrowing of the spread, Receipts, 272 cars. December opened a shade lower at 225g9275c and advanced to 225c.
